

Being an Optimist is a Matter of Choice!

Brethren, as many of you will be very aware, I am and always have been an unashamed optimist. This does not mean that I always have perfect experiences or that everything always works out as planned, just that I always expect it to. I've always held the view that, even if the pessimist's forecast of the eventual outcome proves right, the optimist has a heck of a lot more fun while finding out, so why be a pessimist?

Anyway, a couple of weeks ago we had our now annual Chain's Conference in Bloemfontein - and I'm now feeling very optimistic about our Grand Lodge's future and the direction we are taking. Don't let me mislead you on this. There's still an enormous amount of work to be done, but we are making some real progress and really are having a great deal of fun.

The theme of the Conference was "Building on our Successes" and we examined the attributes of some of our more successful Lodges in an effort to identify common patterns which we could introduce throughout our structures. Without exception, top performing Lodges have properly developed goals and plans and focus on consistently providing a Quality experience to their candidates and members alike. This encompasses high standard ritual workings, organising meaningful charity / social events and a genuine effort to address the educational needs of the newer members in particular. The members of these Lodges are proud to belong to them, enjoy sharing their experiences and make a genuine effort to recruit new Brethren.

This pattern stood out as we reviewed the factors which contributed to the success enjoyed by Burleigh Lodge in Australia and then listened to our own Brethren as they described the experiences of such Lodges as Koh-i-Nor, de Goede Hoop, Tolerance,

Flaming Star, Westerford, Peace and Harmony and First United. While these Lodges are not unique, they are all very good examples of what can be achieved by GLSA Lodges who are applying these basic principles.

Anyway, if these are the ingredients which tend to make our Lodges successful, then Grand Lodge must focus its efforts on doing what we can to assist our Lodges to best implement them - so let me update you on just a small sample of our current projects.

Membership Management: We are very aware of the extreme importance of having a really effective national database of our members. As a result we are in the process of implementing an American software solution that will not only streamline administrative tasks but will also provide our members with services that we could previously only have dreamed about.

We are currently populating the database (a major project in itself) and, as soon as this has reached an advanced enough stage, we'll provide access to all of our Lodges and Brethren. Once this is in place our members will be able to maintain their own personal details and will also have access to a wide variety of material related to the GLSA and our Lodges. This will encompass documentation control, administration and education support. It will change our Masonic lives!

Education: The "Masonic Book of Life" is now given out to every new member joining the GLSA and is updated as he passes through his Craft degrees. It provides him with material related to Freemasonry and the GLSA as well as articles pertinent to each degree and also incorporates the Constitution and Laws. With our new Membership database system, we will now be able to offer still more educational material in line with each Brother's degree level. As the "Masonic Book of Life" will be available electronically through the database, every GLSA member will have access to it.

Ritual Excellence Program: This has been introduced to encourage our Brethren to learn the ritual and it recognises and rewards those who achieve a meaningful standard. It has been successfully launched by the Northern Division team and will be introduced in other Divisions over the coming months.

Masonic Growth: In total terms, the GLSA comprises far more than 3 craft degrees. While these are the foundation on which to build any Masonic career, our organisation also offers a full range of Royal Arch and Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite degrees. Once a Brother has been raised to Master Mason, the allied degrees are immediately accessible to him and he is encouraged to explore them further, and enjoy them, in line with his own Masonic interests.

Jan Hendrik Hofmeyr- a much loved Brother

The 4th Deputy Grand Master National of the Netherlands was, as were all of his predecessors, a Brother with a legal background and a distinguished member of the Lodge de Goede Hoop.

In 1874, Jan Hendrik Hofmeyr was appointed Deputy Grand Master, this being the same year that the Government appointed him as Master of the Supreme



Court. In the early years of his 18 year tenure, he opened 15 new Lodges, but the Depression of 1880s saw Brethren moving from towns to the cities and several Lodges being Hofmeyr's closed. professional duties precluded him from

the travel tendencies displayed by Sir Christofel Brand and, while he seems to have felt personally responsible at the loss of each Lodge, the reality is that the circumstances forced the situation and there is little that he could really have done to change events.

Hofmeyr was a reserved man, with a deep love of everything Masonic. In 1892, the "great fire" which

destroyed so much of the de Goede Hoop Temple had a profound effect on Hofmeyr, who died a few months thereafter. His photograph is to be found in our Masonic Museum, while the 3 statues so splendidly representing Wisdom, Strength and Beauty within the de Goede Hoop Temple, were all erected in Hofmeyr's honour after the Temple had been reconstructed.

Hofmeyr is not to be confused with "Onze Jan", his namesake and the father of Afrikaans, whose statue stands in Hofmeyr Square in Cape Town. "Onze Jan", according to the Dictionary of South African Biography, was one of Hofmeyr's 12 children.

As such, he is betraying our Grand Lodge, the Order and its principles and seriously undermines our efforts to create a better world through the example that we, as Freemasons, set for those around us.

The Golden Rule - the VSL of every single religion has one verse which is present in some or other form. It is included in our 1st degree obligation as:

"Do unto others as you would they do unto you!"

God responded, "I did send help. I sent you." David Wolfe


Almoner's Corner.
