Rewards and challenges

Conducting Lodge installations, presenting Service or Past Master's jewels, attending lodge special occasions or social events, representing the Grand Lodge of Tasmania at interstate Grand Installations, including that of New Zealand and the Victorian Mark Master Masons and being present at a number of Open Installation ceremonies of the Order of the Eastern Star are but a few of the notable and enjoyable events so far this year.

Our travels around Tasmania taking part in Lodge activities have enabled Cyrene and I to meet a great number of people who we would not otherwise have met. This has begun what we are sure will be enduring friendships that we value highly.

One of the first occasions of note that Cyrene and I attended was Ken Woodman's 100th birthday party held at The Tamar Yacht Club in Launceston.

Ken acquitted himself very well reminiscing about events of the past 100 years and regaling the guests with many anecdotes of his eventful life.

During December Cyrene and I attended a joint Army and Navy Lodge and Order of the Eastern Star (Tamar Chapter) function in Launceston at which I had the pleasure of meeting Mrs Edith Lappage, the 103 year old widow of the late George Lappage, formerly a member of Army and Navy Lodge.

Also during December we attended the Christmas meeting of The Pacific Lodge at which I had the honour and pleasure to present an Eighty Year bar to the service jewel of Bro Keith Welsh, who also received a Grand Lodge Order of Distinguished Service and the rank of Past Grand Tyler.

At the same meeting I presented an Order of Distinguished Service to Worshipful Brother Ivan Wass who I have known for more than 50 years.

Appointments vs elections

The matter of appointments instead of elections for our Grand Lodge Ceremonial Teams and both Boards will be debated and decided at this month's Communication.

This is a step in the progress of Tasmanian Freemasonry that is both sensible and in my opinion desirable.

At our recent elections there were a total of 46 positions to be filled and in only nine instances was there a ballot for the position.

This cost the members of Freemasonry Tasmania in excess of \$1 000 and many man hours of unrewarded labour by our Returning Officer and his team of helpers.

I ask every member to read these statistics very carefully and then to attend the February Communication and express their opinion in a reasoned and logical manner.

Ruling on Obligations

The last Communication confirmed the decision by the Board of General Purposes that the obligations of each degree would not be repeated by the candidate when taking the next degree; only the answers to the questions would be learnt and repeated.

The ruling allows for a brother who wishes to learn and repeat his obligation to do so after application to the Grand Secretary for dispensation. This brings us into line with most of the rest of the world.

Building changes

There is slow but sure change taking place with our Lodge buildings.

It is very heartening to see the development of The Derwent Valley Masonic Centre and the rationalisation of Lodge buildings in the Derwent Valley.

The interest being shown in the establishment of a working Masonic Lodge Room at Longford is progressing and we look forward to the occasion of a lodge meeting again being held in those premises.

There are small but significant improvements to a number of our other buildings and I am confident that there will be a dramatic improvement generally over the next few years.

The prospect of the Board being able to make grants from the building fund to qualifying lodge building owners will be debated at the August Communication and, if passed, will enable some projects to proceed which would otherwise have stalled.

I wish everyone a happy and successful 2009 and an enjoyable year of Masonic activities.

Prestigious award for 'our' medical scholar

A university student supported by the Tasmanian Masonic Centenary Medical Research Foundation has received a prestigious award from the Australian Society for Medical Research.

Catherine Blizzard, who is in the third year of her PhD studies at the Menzies Research Institute, received the University of Tasmania (population and health theme) student award.

This recognises outstanding contributions to medical research by Tasmanian tertiary students, and gives them opportunities to share their study results with the medical research community.

The presentation was made by the State Convenor of the Medical Research Society, Dr Tracey Dickson (who was also supported as a scholar by the Medical Research Foundation) at an annual medical research dinner in Hobart.

The dinner was addressed by distinguished immunologist, Sir Gustav Nossal, who congratulated Ms Blizzard on her success.

The Medical Research Foundation was represented by W Bro David Louez.

Ms Blizzard's work aims to increase understanding of how the brain responds to traumatic injury, such as that experienced during car accidents, with the goal of identifying potential therapeutic interventions to help survivors.



The award will go towards overseas travel to enable Ms Blizzard to present her research findings to an international audience.

The President of the Masonic Centenary Medical Research Foundation, W Bro Brian Sims, said the Foundation was also invited to the launch of the J. O. and J. R. Wicking Trust by the Menzies Centre.

The Trust proposes to establish the Wicking Dementia Research and Education Centre in Tasmania.

'Brother/Professor' in India

A director of the Tasmanian Masonic Research Foundation, Bro Venkat Parameswaran (Parames), *pictured at left*, was an invited speaker at the Biochemists of India Conference and a Continuing Medical Education workshop held in New Delhi.

Dr Parameswaran, who is in charge of the endocrinology laboratory of the Royal Hobart Hospital, is a member of Bowen Lodge and a trustee for his lodge on the board of the Foundation.

The Royal Hobart Hospital newsletter says he has attended workshops and conferences in India since 1998, where his expertise is warmly appreciated by scientific and clinical peers.

At the recent conference, Venkat spoke on the incidence and diagnostic aspects of neuro-endocrine tumours and also made a presentation on an evidence-based approach in diagnosis of thyroid disorders.

The newsletter noted that Venkat has also participated in research and scientific presentations at St John's National Academy of Health Sciences in Bangalore, India, where he is a Visiting Professor.

Meeting 'on the triangle' for 40 years

Freemasons "meet on the level and part on the square, but in this case they "meet on the triangle".

At Oatlands on September 13, 2008, Dorset, Lord Carrington and Merton Lodges marked the 40th year of their annual "triangular meetings".

Dorset Lodge, formed in 1885 at Scottsdale, sponsored the formation of Lord Carrington, which began in 1892 at Fingal. Lord Carrington Lodge sponsored Merton, which began in 1922 at Campbell Town.

An annual triangular meeting was originally proposed by the late RW Bro Norm Doddridge, Master of Merton, and the first was held at Campbell Town in September 1968

At the first meeting the late W Bro Barry Bennetts of Dorset Lodge took the chair, RW Bro Colin Macaulay, Master of Lord Carrington Lodge assumed the office of Senior Warden, and RW Bro Doddridge was Junior Warden.



The next year the meeting was held at Fingal, and subsequently Scottsdale, and then in rotation, remaining an annual event between the Lodges, and missed only due to unavoidable circumstances.

Benevolence in the North West

Tasmania's West Coast and North West Coast Masonic Lodges formed the North West Masonic Benevolence Society Inc. in November 1995. It was established when a proposal to build Masonic homes at Sulphur Creek was abandoned and the money raised towards these homes had been invested.

Interest earned from the investments is donated to various projects that are determined by the Society at the quarterly meetings which are held at Penguin.

The Society is represented by two delegates from each of the ten Lodges on the West and North West Coast who consider requests for financial assistance from various organizations.

In keeping with the objects of the Society "periodic grants are made to selected organisations engaged in the provision of caring services to the aged, disabled and/or infirm on the North West and West Coasts of Tasmania".

There are so many worthy projects that the Society is asked to support that the most difficult task is to determine which of the requests they should support.

In its June 2008 report, the North West Masonic Benevolence Society advised that it had provided financial assistance by way of grants to the value of \$13916 to various North West Coast organisations.

The school of special education at Devonport received \$1 566 for a special tricycle which will allow the children to enjoy the pleasures of riding a bike.

Multicap was allocated \$2750 to assist the staging of a concert, and a \$3000 grant helped Cape Country Accommodation complete a barbecue area for residents.

The Mt St Vincent Nursing Home was granted \$6600 to purchase two special hoists to assist with the movement of some residents.

These bring to \$100760 the total donations made by the Society to various organisations since 1996.

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Counting the years

Eight decades a mason

The first mason to reach an 80 year milestone in Tasmania has received a bar to his service jewel, the conferred rank of Past Grand Tyler and an Order of Distinguished Service jewel.

The honours for Bro Keith Welsh, aged 103, of The Pacific Lodge were performed by the Grand Master, MW Bro Norman Cooper, at the lodge's meeting on December 18, 2008.

As circumstances prevented Bro Welsh from becoming a Master of his Lodge, the rank of Past Grand Tyler was the highest the Grand Master could confer.

Bro Welsh was born in Benalla (Victoria) on Christmas Day in 1905, and served a distinguished career in journalism.

This included his work as a war narrator in World War II, a sports writer for the Hobart Mercury newspaper, and secretary of the journalists' union in Tasmania.

The State's journalism awards are named after him.

He comes from an extended masonic family, with his father and two brothers all masons, his wife the daughter of a mason, and his mother's brothers were both members of the Grand Lodge of Victoria.

Bro Welsh was initiated in Lodge Concord No. 93 NSW Constitution at Albury on November 25, 1928 and was passed and raised during the next year.

After moving to Hobart, he affiliated with Victory Lodge which in 1997 consolidated with The Pacific Lodge.

Newest and oldest

On November 19, 2008, Derwent Valley Lodge initiated and welcomed its newest member, Bro Des Tatchell.

Later that same night Bro Tatchell witnessed the presentation of a Sixty Year Bar to the lodge's oldest member, VW Bro Ken O'Brien.

The presentation was made by the Grand Master, MW Bro Norman Cooper, who also presented a Grand Lodge Service Award certificate to W Bro Leo Tribolet.

VW Bro Bill Giles, on behalf of the members of the lodge, then presented V Wor Bro O'Brien with his Life Membership jewel.

Longevity and service

Former Grand Secretary, RW Bro Kyle Wood, received his Fifty Year Jewel on August 27, 2008, exactly 50 years after his initiation into Hutchins Old Boys' Lodge on August 27, 1958.

Making the presentation on behalf of the Grand Master and Grand Lodge, RW Bro Murray Yaxley said the jewel not only acknowledged RW Bro Wood's longevity but also his extensive service to freemasonry.

He was an active lodge member from the outset and was elected Worshipful Master in 1969.

Becoming a Grand Steward in 1973, he held a succession of positions before being appointed Grand Secretary in 1983.

RW Bro Yaxley said Kyle had always been a fine ambassador for freemasonry.

"Because of his many friends and acquaintances through school and the commercial world there was no shortage of information about Kyle, ranging from schoolboy misdemeanors to his visits to lodge secretaries around Tasmania," he said.

"Anyone who chooses to write his biography will get lots of help".

Kyle's tenure as Grand Secretary was marked by many innovations.

Together with other brethren he helped to establish *The Tasmanian Mason*, later to become *Freemasonry Tasmania*, the masonic passport was born and

the broken column brooch was made available for widows of brethren.

Clear criteria were established for Grand Lodge awards and jewels and the design of Grand Lodge regalia was made more appropriate for brethren who progressed from one office to another.

The Tasmanian masonic lapel pin also came into use.

"Kyle's major challenge, successfully met, was the computerisation of Grand Lodge records," RW Bro Yaxley said.

"Supported by Margaret, Kyle has hosted many barbecues for fellowship and fundraising purposes, and his products as a vigneron have been freely shared".

At home for 60th

A Sixty Year Bar was presented to W Bro Geoffrey Painton of Devonport Masonic Lodge, who requested that the ceremony be done at his home.

His wife Lorna provided a pleasant morning tea and some of Geoff's best Scotch was consumed.

W Bro Painton was initiated on May 19, 1948 into Mersey Lodge at Devonport, where he was Master in 1959.

Freemasons' Homes of Southern Tasmania

Fundraising foundation established

A Freemasons Homes Foundation has been established to raise funds to enhance the quality of life for residents.

It will also establish and maintain links with the widest possible community of stakeholders in the Homes.

The Board of the Homes has employed Christine Howard (pictured) as the Foundation's Executive Officer.

Christine lived in Lindisfarne until she left home to start general nursing training at Launceston General Hospital.

She then nursed in London for some years before returning to live in Sydney and complete certificates in intensive care, midwifery and paediatrics.

Employment in the community health sector of the NSW Health Commission followed.

Christine helped establish and run multi-disciplinary health centres in Caringbah and Rockdale and was then appointed as supervisor of some 150 private hospitals and nursing homes in southern area of Sydney.



She then moved into public relations and fundraising and in 1980 went to work at Sydney's Royal Alexandra Hospital for Children.

As the Public Relations Officer she ran the successful campaign to raise funds for the first Ronald McDonald House in Australia, worked with the Telethon team (more than \$1.5 million was raised), co-ordinated volunteers, conducted tours for school groups and attended many community functions as guest speaker.

Marriage and motherhood were the next career moves followed by part-time teaching of health subjects in the Diploma of Child Studies for TAFE NSW.

In 1990, with two small children, Christine moved back to Tasmania and spent the next eleven years as Director of Development at The Friends School.

In this role she raised several million dollars, expanded the data base of old scholars and helped with production of a quarterly school newspaper.

Immediately before her appointment to the Freemasons Homes Foundation, Christine was employed part-time at Jane Franklin Hall as Community Relations Manager and in her spare time was being a marriage and funeral celebrant.

She is excited about her role with the Freemasons Homes Foundation.

"My mother, Mollie Howard, spent the last five years of her life as a resident at the Freemasons Homes."

"I am delighted to give something back to the organisation which gave so much to my mother and to the rest of my family".

Christine has another strong link to Freemasonry: her paternal grandfather, Harold Howard, donated the land on which the current Masonic building in Franklin stands. A plaque on the building records this fact.

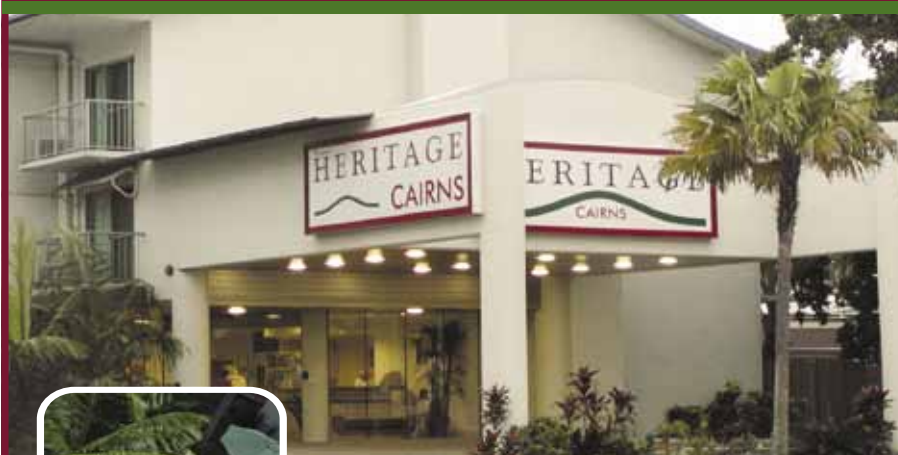
The land is next to the one-time Howard's Emporium.

In those days, the late 1800s, Franklin was a thriving metropolis and the centre of the Huon apple industry and Howard's Emporium was a most successful commercial entity.

A ceremony was held on November 8, 2008 to rededicate the monument at Tamar Valley Court (formerly Tamar Valley Retirement Village).

This was followed by the official opening of a new community centre by the Grand Master, MW Bro Norman Cooper.

Tamar Valley Court is now owned and operated by Masonic Peace Haven,

The bakery does not normally do outside catering but wanted on this occasion to make a contribution to the local aged care community.

Donation to "Fred's House"

The project is being developed by Island Master Marketing, with material and labour donated by local suppliers and construction to be undertaken by Hotondo Homes.

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Around the World

People of the Book

Within freemasonry the term VSL (Volume of the Sacred Law) can apply to many sacred writings important to the membership.

There is another phrase that alludes to that same inclusive and tolerant viewpoint: within Islam the phrase "People of the Book" refers to the sacred writings of all of the children of Abraham.

Christians, Muslims and Jews are referred to as "People of the Book" because they share a common spiritual ancestry and all trace their theological roots back to the covenant that God established with them through Abraham.

In the September 2008 issue of *The Alberta Freemason* the Grand Chaplain provides a timely article on this subject. It is timely because September marks a significant holy period for Muslim and Jewish people.

For Muslims there is the month of Ramadan and for the Jewish, Rosh Hashanah occurs on September 30 and begins a period of ten days, ending with the holiest day of Judaism, Yom Kippur.

The article points out that as freemasons we might recognise many similarities in our symbols and rituals that we share with "People of the Book".

The most important beliefs are tolerance, care for our fellow man and showing due respect to the Creator.

If you are fortunate enough to have Jews or Muslims in your lodge (or among your associates) it is appropriate to wish them well during these special holy periods. And we would all do well to learn more about the meanings attached to the customs related to these periods.

Mark Twain inspires

In response to a request from the 2004 meeting of the Grand Masters of North America, the Masonic Information Centre has committed itself to improving public awareness of freemasonry.

It annually recognises lodges that have demonstrated exemplary work in constructing a positive Masonic identity within the lodge itself and for the local community.

These lodges receive the Mark Twain Masonic Awareness Award. The award borrows Mark Twain's identity as a lively innovative communicator whose work consistently challenged the listeners and readers to think and act responsibly and to ask questions and seek enlightenment.

Mark Twain (1835-1910) was born Samuel Clemens. He joined Polar Lodge in Missouri in 1861 and later Carson Lodge in Nevada.

Grand Lodge of Ghana

In Ghana there are currently 18 lodges that meet under the auspices of the Grand Lodge of Ireland, 28 under the Grand Lodge of Scotland and a further 57 that owe allegiance to the United Grand Lodge of England.

The first two groups of lodges constituted a new Grand Lodge of Ghana which came into being on December 7 and 8, 2008.

Although the UGLE lodges will not be joining the new Grand Lodge of Ghana, an English deputation attended its inauguration.

Provisional recognition of the Grand Lodge of Ghana was granted in September, to enable the visit to take place without contravening the normal recognition and visitation protocols.

Amphictiony

Now there is a word that should challenge the best scrabble players.

Those who do not have English as a first language often come up with unfamiliar words and send us scurrying to the Oxford Dictionary.

Such was the case when I read the heading, "Third Amphictiony of Lodges of Greek Isles". Sure enough, the word is defined as "a confederation or league of neighbouring states for the common interest".

The theme of the conference of lodges of the Greek Isles was "The development and promotion of Freemasonry through new technologies".

There have been many inventions that changed the lives of the people living at the time of their inception but none so profound or with the immediate prospect of globalisation, as the Internet.

The theme of the conference was a worthy one for those who would make a daily advancement in knowledge, masonic or otherwise.

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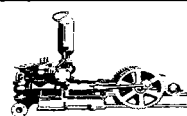
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Looking back

Combined history comes to an end

Rosebery Lodge No. 20 TC would have celebrated its fifteenth year next month, but sadly it had to hand in its charter in March last year. Most of its surviving members are now members of the Mount Lyell Lodge.

Here is an edited version of a combined history of the Rosebery and Zeehan lodges presented by W Bro Peter Schulze to the last night of Rosebery Lodge No. 20 on March 29, 2008:

Rosebery Lodge came into existence in 1993, being the amalgamation of Zeehan Lodge and Rosebery Lodge No. 52 TC.

Its first Master was W Bro Tas Pitman and W Bro Alan Walker was its last, and both attended the handing-in of the charter.

Zeehan Lodge commenced on December 3, 1890, the same year

Grand Lodge was established in Tasmania.

It lasted 103 years before amalgamating with Rosebery Lodge No.52 to form Rosebery Lodge No. 20.

Its first Master, W Bro J. M. Hazlett was the founder of the Amalgamated Miners Association.

This group revolutionised politics in Tasmania and founded a Labour Party.

This resulted in Tasmania becoming the most advanced social service State in Australia's early years.

The annual conference of the association was held in the Mt Lyell Lodge masonic hall.

Zeehan Lodge sponsored the inauguration of Mt Lyell Lodge No. 24 TC and Rosebery No. 52 TC.

There are records of lodge meetings,

presumably under the English Constitution, being held in Rosebery as early as 1929.

However, the impact on West Coast mining of the Great Depression put paid to many of its meetings.

The Grand Lodge of Tasmania was petitioned for a new Lodge in Rosebery and approval was given in 1938.

Rosebery Lodge No. 52 TC began on May 5, 1938 and continued for 56 years until its amalgamation with Zeehan Lodge to form Rosebery Lodge No. 20 in 1993.

The last Master of No. 52 TC was W. Bro T. D. Cousins, who also attended the charter handing-in ceremony of Rosebery No. 20 on March 29, 2008.

The Vatican has surprised everyone by publishing previously exclusive and unavailable source materials on the hearings against the medieval Knights Templar.

The announcement was of special interest to students of masonic history because the publications may throw some light on the theories concerning the origins of modern freemasonry.

To date there is speculation but no proven links between the two.

October 2007 marked the 700th anniversary of the arrest of the Templars

The Holy See lets us see

and this was seen as an appropriate time to arrange for Processus Contra Templarios to be printed.

It is a limited edition of 800 copies.

The publication is a joint project between the Vatican Secret Archives and Italy's Scrinium Cultural Foundation.

It contains faithful replicas of original parchments together with critical commentary.

It even includes the recently found Chinon Parchment which contains Pope Clement V's absolution of the Templars on charges of heresy which had been the pretext on which King Philip of France tried to eliminate them.

Copies sell for 5,900 Euros. At least three libraries, two in USA and one in England, are known to have purchased copies at this stage.

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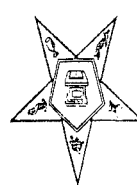
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Satisfying fundraising

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Called to the Grand Lodge Above

Freemasonry, the Hutchins School, the Australian Boys Choir, the church, and sailors off the coast of Tasmania all lost a great communicator, friend, mentor and supporter with the passing, aged 84, of RW Bro Jeffrey Molesworth Boyes BEM PGW on July 15, 2008.

A warm eulogy at his funeral service at The Hutchins School chapel prompted an appeal to its readers by *The Mercury* newspaper for more information about RW Bro Boyes' life and activities.

Journalist Jocelyn Fogagnolo wrote that responses to the appeal highlighted RW Bro Boyes' wide circle of interest and personal friends in marine radio communications, as a soldier, teacher, sailor, choir conductor, church stalwart and freemason.

It was his work in Tascoast radio - reputedly making him the best known contact voice for boating in Australia - which led to the awarding of his British Empire Medal in 1989.

He was marine radio communications officer with the Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania, and later became a life member. This work was based at the RYCT as well as at his Midway Point home, where he maintained an extensive range of radio equipment.

Through radio, he maintained contact with a wide range of sailors virtually right up to the time he had to move into a residential nursing home, shortly before his death.

RW Bro Boyes' eulogy was delivered by Bob Brewster, an ex-pupil of Hutchins and close friend for fifty years.

He said Jeff was an inspiration as an educator and mentor of children, and a strong influence in his ultimate choice of vocation as a schoolmaster.

Mr Brewster said Jeff never married yet would have made a wonderful

parent, as was shown when he became "a breath of fresh air" at the old Hutchins boarding house.

"The advent of Jeff Boyes, whose kindness, sunny nature and enthusiasm coupled with an abiding interest in improving the lot of we hapless boarders captured both our imagination and our loyalty," he said.

Jeffrey Molesworth Boyes was born in Hobart on December 27, 1972, the only son of Charles and Salome Boyes.

He spent his early years at the family home in New Town, where his family became closely affiliated with St James Church.

This connection extended into heavy involvement at St David's Cathedral and later at St George's Church in Sorell, where he filled the varying roles of sides person, organist and chorister.

Educated at the Friends School, he graduated with distinction in 1941 and joined the Second AIF where he was attached to the corps of signals, spending most of the Second World War maintaining communication cables in the Milne Bay area of New Guinea.

Demobbed in 1946, he became a student teacher at Friends Junior School and in 1950 joined the resident staff at Hutchins School (then in Macquarie Street), taught primary school and became involved in the music programme.

After two years overseas teaching in Northumberland, he returned to Tasmania in 1960 to teach at Scotch College in Launceston and later became head of the junior school at Friends before rejoining Hutchins in the early 1970s as development officer, where he stayed until his retirement.

During the 1950s, RW Bro Boyes was a guest conductor of the Australian Boys Choir, and he studied music and drama at the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music.

During his time at Hutchins School he was responsible for staging several Gilbert and Sullivan operas.

Jeff's Masonic career began in Hutchins Old Boys Lodge on April 24,

1979, where he was raised to the degree of a Master Mason on May 8, 1980,

He was Master of the Lodge in 1987-89 and also affiliated with the Hobart Lodge of Research.

He also held the rank of Past Grand Warden

He became well known throughout Tasmanian freemasonry for his long-term editorship of *The Tasmanian Mason*, which he renamed *Freemasonry Tasmania* after the Grand Lodge of Tasmania "rebranded" itself in the public field as Freemasons Tasmania.

His literary interests extended to maintaining a remarkable collection of historic newspapers and documents, some going back hundreds of years, which he arranged to have archived for future generations.

As well, late in life he self-published a book of his experiences, written in the same warm and friendly style which he employed as a teacher, writer and a radio communicator.

Big service shows high regard

The passing of RW Bro Bruce Alexander Godfrey, RFD, ED, Past Grand Warden occurred suddenly in Launceston on October 3, 2008 when he was on his way to attend the Grand Royal Arch Chapter Centenary Celebrations and Installation.

The high regard in which he was held was clearly displayed by one of the largest gatherings seen at a funeral service held in Hobart in recent times - between 500 and 600 people attended.

The service commenced with a Guard of Honour by students from St Michael's Collegiate School Rowing Team who wanted to honour a tireless coach and mentor who spent many hours including early mornings on the River Derwent guiding them in the art of rowing.

Bruce played a major role in the revival and formation of the Derwent Mercantile Collegiate Rowing Club.

After attending the Lansdowne Crescent Primary School and the Hobart Technical College, Bruce qualified as an electrician with the Hydro Electric Commission and then transferred to the Department of Public Works where he became the Electrical Supervisor.

He served in the Royal Australian Air Force during the Second World War.

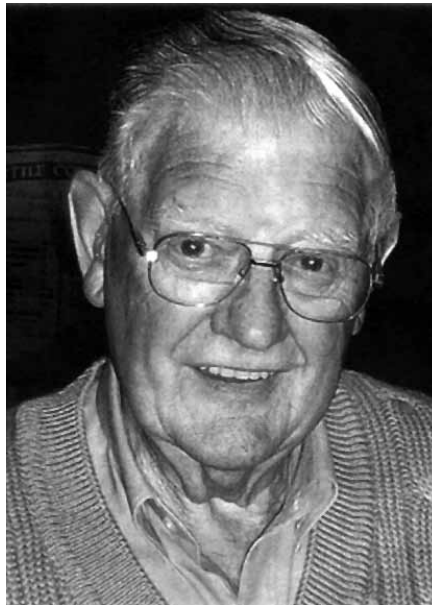
This was followed by a long and distinguished career with Australian Army Reserve rising to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel Rtd, being the Commanding Officer of the 47th Transport Company. He also served in a tour of duty in Vietnam.

Bruce competed in rally car driving, was a keen darts player, secretary and life member of the Power Boat Association of Tasmania and an inaugural member of the Pittwater Golf Club.

He was also an area coordinator for the Red Cross Door Knock Appeals.

Bruce was a highly respected freemason for more than 46 years, having joined Lodge Beltana in January 1962.

This continued a family involvement in freemasonry as his father was a Past Master of The Pacific Lodge.



Bruce progressed through the various offices of Lodge Beltana and was its Master in 1973, 1985 and 1990.

In 1976 he affiliated with Glenora Masonic Lodge, becoming Master in 1979 and 2004.

During his time at Glenora Lodge he was seldom out of office and served many years as Director of Ceremonies.

Bruce joined Grand Lodge in 1981 as a Grand Steward. He progressed through the offices of Grand Standard Bearer, Grand Deacon, Grand Inspector of Lodges and was elected Grand Warden in 1993.

He served as a member of the Board of General Purposes for five years from 1987 and was the representative of the Grand Lodge of North Dakota USA.

Bruce was in several other Orders of freemasonry. In 1974 he joined the Archibald Park Royal Arch Chapter and became First Principal in 1984.

He was elected secretary in 2002, a position he served with distinction until his passing.

In 1977 he joined the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite for Australia and occupied the various offices as a member of the Crown of Life Sovereign

Chapter 18th degree and became the Most Wise Sovereign in 1991.

He then became Director of Ceremonies, a position he held until 2007 when the Chapter amalgamated with the Hobart Chapter.

He was admitted to the Holy Grail Sovereign Council 30th degree in 1992 and served as Grand Commander in 2002. He was subsequently promoted to the 31st degree.

The year 2001 saw Bruce become a member of the Royal Order of Scotland and he regularly attended its meetings until his passing.

In all the areas in which Bruce was involved he left a memory of being a quiet but effective leader. Bruce was a dedicated and loyal freemason, ever ready to give a helping hand, and a great contributor at all levels.

RW Bro Bruce Godfrey made a magnificent contribution to many walks of life and we are all that much richer for having been associated with him.

May he rest in eternal peace.
