As some of those involved were "real" runners they decided to link the event with the Dublin Marathon and compete in this also.

Well, this project is now being organised and it is the intention of these Brethren and some of their friends to undertake the run on behalf of the Grand Master's Festival and support the three Charities. They plan to start from the NI Children's Hospice on Wednesday, 22nd October and finish on Saturday 25th October at the site of the proposed LauraLynn Hospice in the grounds of the Sunshine Homes complex in Sandyford, Dublin.

We would ask you to keep an eye out for this event, as the Brethren will be seeking support form other Brethren and Lodges enroute, with accommodation etc., to help minimise the costs. Grand Master's Address Galway, 8th March 2008

I am delighted to be in Galway on this special anniversary of 275 years of Premier Lodge No. 14. I thank the Provincial Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Basil Fenton and his Brethren for their kind invitation to Grand Lodge knowing that we will all enjoy this landmark event, which, I am confident, will be in true Galway fashion.

I was pleased to meet with the Mayor of Galway and his representatives and to exchange tokens of appreciation and to mark, with them, this keynote day in the life of Lodge No. 14.

Brethren, you all remember the previous Grand Master's Festival at the end of the last millennium where we raised over €600,000 for Alzheimers' sufferers and their carers. It was indeed a major success, and sent out a clear message that we are very much part of society.

The purchase of dedicated Alzheimers' buses in the South and the Telephone Help Line and other smaller projects in the North were excellent ideas and had much impact, if only for a limited period.

Freemasons were active in running many money raising functions in their neighbourhoods and by virtue of this, promoted the Order by giving the public a chance to meet with them and discover that they were normal members of society with nothing more sinister to hide.

Our Past Grand Master's determination to improve society's perception of our Order, has conditioned my Cabinet to the point where we are equally resolved to achieve a similar outcome.

The present Festival is aimed at the Samaritans and Children's Hospices; very worthy causes, by which we will give of our best and trust that both cure and comfort will result.

These projects are undertaken by us as an act of humility in which we do not seek plaudits but rather seek to illustrate to society that we care for the welfare of mankind; that we are not a body of men intent on seeking their own self interests but an inclusive society, embracing those wonderful principles of brotherly love, relief and truth.

My sincerest thank go to R.W.Bro. Richard Ensor, Overall Festival Chairman, R.W.Bro. Rodney McCurley, Northern Chairman and R.W.Bro. Basil Fenton, Southern Chairman. I wish them and their respective committees every success in their endeavours.

Our success has been recognised by the public in a number of ways.

I will never forget the magnificent welcome given to us by the Lady Mayor of Sligo in the Mayor's parlour some years back, when she glorified our Order in her reception speech and left us all stunned by her knowledge of Freemasonry – especially our Past Grand Master, who was left speechless.

A recent report described the cooperative action of Cork City Council and the P.G.L. of Munster in marking Heritage Week when our premises in Cork were opened to the public.

The Masonic Hall, Tuckey Street, was used for the official opening and the formal reception at which the Lord Mayor of Cork, the Provincial Grand Master of Munster and many Brethren were present. Over 400 local people visited the Hall and many commented on the favourable impression which they formed.

A further report of the daughter of a Provincial Officer from Wicklow & Wexford, ranges from her original disgust that her father was a Freemason, to her pride when she discovered what the Order is all about:

Our running of Grand Masters' Festivals which assist Medical Research Projects and many others, all of which she referred to as the soul of Freemasonry and described it as 'Proud but not Loud.' How appropriate!

She finished: 'Today, I can say with an open heart – I am proud of Irish Freemasonry and I am proud of my father's role in it.'

The highlight of the last quarter was the dedication, in February, of the new Masonic Hall in Ballintoy, Co.



Antrim. On the day, I was delighted to accompany R.W.Bro. John Dunlop and his officers to the Dedication Ceremony.

We had a truly wonderful day with representatives from local and other Lodges, many of whom who gave significant financial assistance to the Ballintoy Brethren which resulted in a very impressive building. If you are ever in the North Antrim area, stop by and have a look.

The Brethren are to be congratulated for all their hard work, sweat, blood and tears which they expended in this project. It is a credit to all and the result of their vision, commitment and dedication in achieving such a significant outcome.

Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth are the principles on which our individual and combined foundations are built.

The Ballintoy Brethren have laid new physical foundations in the building of this magnificent temple which I am sure will stand as a symbol of Freemasonry for time immemorial. Ballintoy is a particularly old Lodge which will celebrate 250 years of working in 2013. We wish them well.

On a broader front, we are all greatly saddened by the pending closure and sale of the Rosemary St. building in Belfast, Headquarters of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Antrim. I was at their recent meeting in the hall on 23rd February and it was heart rending to think that there was no return.

A number of the resident Lodges have surrendered their warrants and sadly some individual members have resigned. I wish the displaced Lodges and members well and may their temporary state be of short duration. Grand Lodge News Page 3

Prior to the Especial Communication, the Grand Master and other Distinguished Brethren were Guests at a Reception and Luncheon, at which 124 Brethren were present.



ANCIENT DONEGAL LODGE No. 588 CELEBRATES 225 YEARS

Donegal Masonic Lodge is aptly titled 'Ancient' in that it was granted a Warrant in June 1781 and the same day the Isle of Inch Lodge No. 589 was Constituted. At that time both Lodges sat in Co. Donegal, now Lodge No. 589 is based at Bishop Street in Londonderry. The two Lodges meet in fraternal friendship on a regular basis.

The earliest records of Ancient Donegal in existence date from 1802, with the Lodge seal spelling the name as 'Donegall'. In the 1920's Lodge membership stood at around 100, in recent years there are about 40 Brethren on the Lodge roll.

A sign of the Lodge's confidence in the future is reflected in the Masonic Hall being re-roofed and renovated, with the feature of the welcoming open coal fire being retained. Victory Masonic Lodge No. 522 Killybegs now also hold their Communications in Donegal town.
