Grand Master's Address to Grand Lodge on St. John's Day- 27th December 2010



18th October 2010 Lodge 184 Magheralin

I was very impressed by the quality of working and unity of purpose exhibited by the Brethren as well as the especial performance of the Lodge Secretary, W.Bro. Trevor Waddell, whose administration skills and dedication to the task were superb. He personally exercises a great interest in building and preserving a successful Lodge and I congratulate him for that. The Brethren were obviously committed to attending and received much pleasure from their membership. The Secretary sent me a very nice letter where he stated that I did not realise the tremendous lift which my visit had given to their small growing Lodge and, I must say, which gave me equal satisfaction.

20th October 2010 Lodge 68 Youghal

I travelled to Youghal via Dublin with the Grand Secretary, which was a visit I looked forward to making, as my memories of Lodge 68 go back to my time as Secretary of St. Columb's Lodge, Moville, Co. Donegal, when we made annual payments to them for the purpose of improving their Lodge premises. Our view at the time was that they were very much in the far flung frontiers, just as it was with us. It was a wonderful visit which impressed me considerably.

14th – 21st November 2010 Hong Kong & Singapore – P.G.L. of The Far East & South East Asia

Our visit to Hong Kong and Singapore was a wonderful experience. The weather was ideal in both Provinces and we were treated exceptionally well.

The Provincial Grand Lodge of the Far East was constituted in 1989 since it was an Inspectorate and had since qualified as a Province due to the increase in its Lodges. The outgoing Provincial Grand Master was R.W.Bro. Chamson Chau, who succeeded R.W.Bro. Arthur Gomez as Inspector and is well known to many in Ireland, was a wonderful P.G.M. in his time. He was succeeded by R.W.Bro. Brendan Bong, whom I installed on my visit and whom I also rate very highly. The P.G.L. of the Far East has been in good hands and will continue to be well led by the new P.G. M. I wish him every success.

The Provincial Grand Lodge of the South East was constituted earlier by the P.G. Master of Sri Lanke, R.W.Bro. Harindran who also installed the new P.G.M. R.W.Bro. Lau Kee Siong for which I thank him sincerely. The new P.G.M. is most active and very capable, in unison with his Deputy Grand Master, to develop this Province in a meaningful and appropriate manner. Again, the generosity of the South Eastern Brethren was outstanding and I am very confident that we will see significant development in these two theatres of Irish Freemasonry. I wish the Brethren every success knowing that in their hands new levels can be achieved and I am confident that I can expect no less. I also wish them every success.

2nd December 2010 Lodge 598 Randalstown

My visit to Lodge 598 in Randalstown was an enjoyable experience where, once again, the quality of the Lodge Secretary was most apparent in that he was well organised and most professional in his performance. My task was to present two 60 year medals to W.Bros. S.J. Millar (1947) and David Jamison (1950), elderly Brethren who had given their all to the Lodge and to Freemasonry. I thank them for that and wish them continued good health and long life. I also presented 50 year medals to W.Bros. J.C. Luke (1953) and C.W. Cullen (1955). These members have given commitment and energy to the well-being of 598 and to its glorious antiquity.

Lodge 598 was the Lodge of the late William Mawhinney who served as Assistant Grand Master when I was Deputy and with whom I had very good relations.

16th December 2010 Lodge 799 Castlederg

Lodge 779 invited me to present 50 year medals to two Brethren, one of a long standing involvement and one who has achieved much in Freemasonry and now prevails as the Provincial Assistant Grand Master of Tyrone & Fermanagh, namely R.W.Bro. Norman Humes. Norman has coped with a serious illness for sometime and faces more treatment at the present time. I wish him well and may he see this difficulty through and emerge at the other side undamaged.

Castlederg hosts a Weather Station in its precincts and sets the standard for the rest of Northern Ireland in relation to temperature. I visited the area on a night when -17°C was prevailing.

Young Musician of the Year 16th October 2010

As we said on the Final night, it was an occasion on which to remember that Mozart was still a youth when he was first helped on his way by the patronage of Freemasons in Vienna. Later, when he became a Mason, his Lodge was called 'Beneficence'. Visit to Hong Kong by the Grand Master

After 10 happy and successful years as the Provincial Grand Master of the Provincial Grand Lodge of the Far East, R.W. Bro. Chamson Chau decided to pass the mantle on to a 'younger' Brother and the Grand Master graciously appointed R.W. Bro. Brendan S.C. Bong, Provincial Assistant Grand Master, as his successor.

To our delight, The Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother George Dunlop, accepted the invitation of the Provincial Grand Lodge of the Far East to come to Hong Kong to Install our new Provincial Grand Master, the first time that this has been done in Hong Kong in over 20 years. R. W. Bro. Chamson being Installed in Dublin during the 275th Anniversary of Irish Freemasonry and our first Provincial Grand Master, R.W. Bro. Arthur Ernest Gomes, being Installed by the then Grand Master, Most Worshipful The Honourable Marquess of Donegall in Hong Kong, immediately following the Constitution of the Provincial Grand Lodge of the Far East on the 9th March 1989.

A working party was immediately set up to organise this very special event, and the social activities, which would hopefully make this visit to Hong Kong by the Grand Master truly memorable.

The Grand Master, accompanied by Right Worshipful Barry Lyons, the Grand Secretary, arrived in good health after a long flight from

Dublin via London in the early evening of Monday 15th November 2010. They were met at the Hong Kong International Airport by the Provincial Grand Master Designate and the Provincial Grand Secretary, V.W. Bro. Terry Hicks, who had met the Grand Master and the Grand Secretary on many occasions at Grand Lodge.

The current Provincial Grand Master and the Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies (myself), awaited their arrival in the Executive Lounge of the hotel that the Grand Master and the Grand Secretary were staying in and, after they refreshed, we all had the first of several meals together.

The Grand Master had specifically requested that as many Entered Apprentices, Fellow Crafts and Master Masons as possible should attend and that he would like to specifically meet as many of them as he could. This was duly arranged and 88 Brethren from the 7 Irish Lodges in Hong Kong attended.

Wednesday was the big day and lunch was arranged for us all at Zetland Hall, Kennedy Road which is the home of Freemasonry in Hong Kong. As Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies, I will be for ever eternally grateful for the advice and guidance given to me by the Grand Master and the Grand Secretary with regard to the Ceremony itself.

The Ceremony itself went very well and this was in no small way due to the advice and guidance that I had been previously given and to all the Provincial Grand Officers playing their part to an exceptionally high standard. Apart from the Grand Master and the Grand Secretary, we were graced with the presence of distinguished Brethren from the Provincial Grand Lodge of New Zealand, the Provincial Grand Lodge of Sri Lanka, the Provincial Grand Lodge of South East Asia, the District Grand Lodge of

Groomsport 337 Centenary Year

Groomsport Masonic Lodge No. 337 in the Province of Down extended a very warm welcome to their Provincial Grand Master, R. W. Bro. Richard Gray and other distinguished guests on Saturday 8th January 2011 to the Maxwell Hall Groomsport.

2011 is the Lodge centenary year and an excellent turn out of members and guests was very encouraging.

The Lodge is particularly looking forward to the Centenary Church Service to be held in the local Parish Church and conducted by the Rector, the Rev. Duncan Pollock on Sunday 1st May. In 1911 following their quest for accommodation in the village and with the approbation of the Maxwell family the Lodge was permitted the use of the Parish Halls.

Lodge 337 was constituted on 2nd December 1911 and the first Worshipful Master and founding member was the Rector of the Church, The Rev. Brother S.S. Holmes MA, who also served as Secretary of the RNLI at Groomsport between 1898 and 1900.

The Installing Officer, W. Bro. Ronnie Piper conferred an excellent degree in installing V. W. Bro. William A Graham as W. Master for 2011.

In a short and simple ceremony W. Bro. Graham Eve, Lodge Secretary was presented by the Brethren with Provincial Grand Lodge of Down regalia prior to his formal investiture as Provincial Grand Lodge Steward by the Provincial Grand Master on 29th January 2011 in Belfast.

R. W. Bro. Gray presented Centenary Jewels to Brother Ross Caughey, R.W.Bro. Ernie Woods and W.Bro. Teddy Larmour both having over 50 years continuous membership.

The W. Master explained the inspiration leading to the design and commissioning of this special jewel. He described how in appreciation for the use of the Maxwell Halls the Brethren on 27th November 1911 presented Miss Isabella and Annabella Maxwell with a beautiful illuminated address. This address is a fixture in the halls and in addition to the text displays images of Groomsport Harbour, Cockell Row, Groomsport House, (The Maxwell family Home) and a Lifeboat. All of which embrace the culture of this fishing village in 1911.

These images illustrate the culture of this fishing village and the inextricable links 337 have with the coast line of the area and the sea. It is a documented fact that many of its original membership were local fishermen and members of the lifeboat crew.

Following considerable research and superb cooperation by the RNLI and "Friends of Hilbre Island" in the person of Valerie Burnett this particular lifeboat on the illuminated address was after 100 years identified and traced.

CHAPMAN as she was named was a legacy of Mrs M.H. Chapman, West Brompton, London. Described in its day as a "Liverpool Class Lifeboat"; Chapman measured 35 feet by 10 feet, weighed 4 tons and was built to RNLI design in 1900/1901 on the River Thames London.

Chapman was a non self righting lifeboat with a crew of 15. Twelve oarsmen, a coxswain, an assistant coxswain and a bowman. This overall description perfectly matched the image on the address, i.e. six oars men either side. This was replicated on the centenary jewel against a background of sea and sky.

Chapman was on station in Groomsport from 1901 to 1920; she launched 16 times and rescued 18 lives.

Her Coxswain between 1901 and 1920, Henry Watterson, was a member of the Lodge as was her final coxswain at Groomsport, between 1918 and 1920, Robert Watterson. Chapman was withdrawn from Groomsport in 1920 and was held in reserve by the RNLI until 1924 when she was relocated to Hilbre Island, off the Wirral peninsula. Her final launch as a lifeboat



was in July 1937 being decommissioned in 1939 and sold privately.

Chapman was later used as a pleasure craft in Blackpool and a Pilot boat until abandoned on the banks of the River Ribble in the late 1990's.

At this time Chapman now in a distressed state was purchased by Mr. John Parr, a Wirral business man with a particular interest in old lifeboats. Mr Parr brought Chapman back to Cammel Lairds Yard, Birkenhead and totally restored her.

On Bank Holiday Monday, August 2003 Chapman was unveiled at Hoylake Lifeboat Day for the first time since her restoration. Hoylake Lifeboat Station was celebrating its 200th Anniversary as one of the world's oldest lifeboat stations.

Chapman is the oldest surviving Liverpool type lifeboat in the World and proudly stands recorded alongside such famous vessels as H. M. Victory, The Cutty Sark and similar ships. In 2003 Chapman was registered on the national register of Historic Vessels.

It is the intention of Mr. Parr to eventually purchase Hoylake Old Lifeboat station and after turning it into a museum have Chapman as the centre piece.

cluded candle-lighting, readings, survivors' recollections and music and was attended by politicians, ambassadors, religious leaders, academics, representatives of communities and organisations and people from all walks of life.



APPOINTMENT AS REPRESENTATIVE OF THE GRAND LODGE OF IRELAND AT THE UNITED GRAND LODGE OF QUEENSLAND IN AUSTRALIA

On 2nd October 2010 the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ireland acknowledged a nomination from the M.W. Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of Queensland, Australia, and appointed V.W.Bro. Robert Louis Grimshaw A.G.S.Works as Representative of the Grand Lodge of Ireland at or near the United Grand Lodge of Queensland. V.W.Bro. Grimshaw succeeds R.W.Bro. Stan Rawlings P.A.G.M. who held the Commission for the past twenty two years and gave sterling service as the Representative of the Grand Lodge of Ireland over this period.

Besides being an active Grand Lodge Officer, V.W.Bro. Grimshaw is also a member, and the Director of Ceremonies, of the Duke of Leinster Lodge No. 8 UGLQ, which was consecrated No. 283 I.C. in 1864. He is also a member and Secretary of Theodore Unmack Lodge No. 60 UGLQ (337 IC 1889). He follows a long line of Representatives for the Grand Lodge of Ireland, which began in 1912 under the Sovereign Grand Lodge of Queensland, all of whom have been members of the Duke of Leinster Lodge.

The first to hold the Commission was M.W.Bro. Hutton P.G.M. G.L.Q., soon to be followed by M.W.Bro.Theodore Unmack P.G.M. G.L.Q. who held the office until his death in 1919. M.W.Bro. Hutton was the first Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Queensland in 1904 and the last Provincial Grand Master of the Irish Constitution in Queensland in that same year. M.W.Bro. Unmack was also a Provincial Grand Master of the Irish Constitution in Queens-



land from 1881 to 1892 and was a leading light in Freemasonry in Queensland for over fifty three years.

The Representative wears a distinguishing collaret jewel which was struck by the Grand Lodge of Ireland in 1913 and which bears the

words Representative Grand Lodge of Ireland. This jewel was manufactured from sterling silver by J. B. Ryan & Co., Watchmakers and Jewellers, College Green, Dublin.

V.W. Bro. Grimshaw, Australian born and a 4th generation Freemason, comes from an Irish background as his father, a Freemason, was Irish, being born in Lurgan, Co. Armagh, in Northern Ireland and his maternal Irish great-grandfather came to Australia in 1849 from Co. Cavan to become one of Australia's early pastoral pioneers. His sister has lived in Ballymoney, Co. Antrim, for the past fifty-years and his wife's mother came from Dublin – so it can be said that he has a vested interest in all things Irish. From his earliest time as a Freemason he has shown a keen interest in Irish Freemasonry. This interest is embedded in the Grand Lodge of Ireland, early Irish Freemasonry in Australia in general and in Queensland in particular. He has done much research in this field of interest and has compiled several papers relating to Irish Freemasonry.

He has said that it is his intention to ensure that the Grand Lodge of Ireland recognises that they are well represented in the United Grand Lodge of Queensland by his presence there.


Sephar Masonic Lodge No. 810 moves to Ballylesson
