Text of Reception Speech by the Mayor of Sligo, Councillor Rosaleen O'Grady on 4th March 2006 to the delegation from Grand Lodge lead by the Grand Master, M.W.Bro. Eric Waller.

Long Service Awards



The November Communication of Leslie J. Thompson Lodge No. 61, in the Province of Down, was an evening of celebration and presentation. The Provincial Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Robert J Armstrong was in attendance to present long-service awards and commemorate a total of 166 years of service, to three stalwarts of the Lodge, namely:-

W.Bro. George Ferrett, who received a 50 year medal and is a Past Treasurer and Past Secretary. On accepting his medal, he recalled how in the 1920's. Lodae Festive **Boards** something of a family affair with spouses and girlfriends attending and crèches being organised for the children. In the 1930's an embargo was placed on membership because of the large number of new members wishing to join and during the May meeting in 1941, wartime bombs shattered the windows of the Newtownards Road Hall while their meeting was in progress.

W.Bro. Tommy Ferrett, who marked 60 years, was presented with a bar to his 50 year medal; he was Secretary for 25 years and a Past Provincial Grand Master's Standard Bearer.

Tribute was also paid to 90 year old W. Bro. Reggie Baston, who has completed 56 years membership, was Secretary of the Newtownards Road Hall Committee for 16 years and despite battling illness, is still as keen as ever to attend lodge meetings.

Long service in office is indeed a feature of Lodge 61. The Lodge also has a long tradition of family membership. George and Tommy's father George and their Uncle Albert were members of the Lodge. The late W. Bros. Eddie Sye and J.R. McCaffrey were Secretary and Treasurer for 45 and 40 years respectively.

50 Year Jewel & Certificate

W.Bro. Charles Fyfe was manager of The Parish Football Club, Bangor around 1940. He also played rugby for Newtownards. He worked for the Prudential Insurance. Was a member of Ballyholme Yacht Club and was the proud owner of a "Waverley Class Yacht" named "Rob Roy" which he raced very successfully. He won the Regatta Cup at Cushendun in the "Enterprise Class" race.

Charles was Worshipful Master of Harmony Lodge No. 286 in 1972 and presented his father with his 50 year jewel on 7th August 1978. He moved to Canada in 1975 and joined Freemasonry there and has remained in contact with the Lodge ever since and when home on holidays makes a point off visiting Harmony. W.Bro. Charles has received many offices in all parts of Masonry in Canada – too many to mention. He is also a Pipe Major of Rameses Pipe Band – a very busy man!!

D-Day Veteran is W.M. of Lodge 15, Skibbereen, Co. Cork

Thomas Richard Roberts is the current Worshipful Master of Lodge No.15, Skibbereen, not a remarkable thing you may say, but in his case it is very remarkable indeed, as he is 90 years of age. This excellent member of our Order was born in England, one of 11 children, 9 boys and 2 girls. He and his twin sister are the sole survivors and indeed he has been a widower now for a number of years.

Prior to the war he worked in a tyre company closely associated with The Dunlop Tyre Co. In 1939, because of his training with the Red Cross, he joined the R.A.F. Medical Corps and was mainly stationed with Fighter Command, all over the British Isles. After Dunkirk, as invasion seemed imminent, he and thousands of other military personnel, Government Officers, women and children were evacuated to Canada. Tom spent 2 years in Canada and from the distinct lack of information forthcoming, the suspicion is that he had a rather good time there!

On his return to England he volunteered for the R.A.F. Parachute Regiment and went into training for D day. On 6th June they successfully landed in France ahead of the main army in and around Caen. They spent about 3 weeks shuttling the most seriously wounded back by air

to Britain. After all that, he still wasn't let off as he was sent to India, from there to Burma but, in his own words, "as luck would have it, the Japs surrendered when they saw me!"

After the war he worked for Royle's Printing & Publishing Co. of London and lived with his wife and family in Lewes. In 1958 he joined South Saxon Lodge No. 311 (E.C). This Lodge had 92 members so the progression to the chair was very slow indeed. His excellent ability as an administrator

was recognised however and he was Secretary of the Lodge for 4 years. Later he helped to found Circle of Sussex Lodge No. 7905 where he had been elected Inner Guard when he and his wife decided to come to live in Ireland. That was 26 years ago and when his travels in this country finally found him settled in west Cork, he affiliated to Skibbereen Lodge and at last, became a Worshipful Master. On leaving the chair he worked as Secretary of the Lodge for several years and was again elected W.M. for 2005 & 2006 - celebrating his 90th birthday on 12th February 2006. What a headline to us all.

Age has not wearied this old soldier nor has his courage diminished. He travelled alone to New Zealand in October 2005 and toured both North & South Islands. He enjoyed it all so much he plans to return there as soon as funds allow.

At the May 2005 meeting of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Munster, the P.G.M., R.W.Bro. Alan J Campbell, invested this outstanding Mason as an Hon. Past Provincial Junior Grand Warden, an honour he richly deserved.

We all wish V.W.Bro. Tom Roberts many more years to enjoy his Masonic activities.

Have Clubs, will travel...

Bro. Andrew Cochrane, (known to all as Drew) will once again pack his golf clubs and fly off to Tokyo, Japan, in early April 2006 to compete in the World Championships. Drew would never claim to be the best golfer in the world, but without doubt he is one of the best blind golfers in the world.

In 1980 he lost his sight, up to then he was a keen golfer, playing off an 11 handicap at Ballymena Golf Club. When his sight deteriorated, he sold his clubs, thinking his golfing days were over. It was ten years later, having attended a seminar at the Blind Centre in Belfast, that golf for the Blind was mentioned. In Drew's own words, "I thought, I'll give it a go, and having done so, found the enthusiasm returning." He now competes off a Blind Handicap of 28, with a blind disability grade of B2.

He has been competing and winning prizes all over the world ever since. Twice in Australia, three times in Japan, two events in the U.S.A, two visits to Canada and one to South Africa. In one of his visits to Japan he came 2nd in the World Championships. He was 4th in Australia; he won the Order of Merit in Stockport in 2000 and in so doing, earned himself an all expenses paid trip to Australia in the same year. He even picked up a prize at our own Grand Masters Millennium Cup at Killymoon Golf Club in Cookstown in 2002.

Not a bad record for a Brother in his 65th year who seems to have enough energy for 10 sighted men.

Drew joined Masonry in 2000, becoming a Member of Three Brothers Lodge No. 775 in Ballymena,



where he was recently invested as Junior Deacon.

So early in April, Drew, with his guide, W.Bro. Warren Stewart will once again tread the fairways of Tokyo in search of further glory and that elusive World Championship.

We wish him well in his quest.

Irish Night Creates History in Queensland – Australia

History was made in the Masonic jurisdiction of Queensland, Australia, when the Grand Hall became New South Wales soil for the first time in March this year. This occurred when the Irish Lodges Association of Queensland held its Annual Irish Night Communication to celebrate St Patrick's Day and invited the visiting Worshipful Master, Officers and Brethren of Lodge Ku-ring-gai, from Sydney, to constitute and form a Lodge under the New South Wales Constitution and confer a Second Degree on one of their own candidates.

Theodore Unmack (337 IC-1889) No. 60 UGLQ was the host Lodge for the event. All attending brethren were assembled inside Grand Hall prior to the Lodge being Tyled. The Officers of Theodore Unmack Lodge entered occupied their respective stations. The Worshipful Master of Theodore Unmack Lodge, W.Bro. Bill Gregson, then called on the Director of Ceremonies to present to him separately the Masters and Brethren of the Lodges of St Patrick (279 IC-1863) No 5 UGLQ; Duke of Leinster (283 IC-1864) No. 8 UGLQ; United Tradesmen's (288 IC-1865) 12 UGLO and Southern Queensland (312 IC-1878) No. 29 UGLQ; the Masters being invited to occupy the chairs of SW, JW, SD and JD respectively. Theodore Unmack Lodge was then opened for labour.

During the proceedings a team of Grand Officers led by the Grand Master, M.W.Bro. John Menzies, accompanied by R.W.Bro. Stan Rawlings P.A.G.M. – Representative of the Grand Lodge of Ireland at or near the United Grand Lodge of Queensland, entered and were duly greeted with the traditional Céad Míle Failte; Gaelic for 'one hundred thousand welcomes'.

W.Bro. Trevor Martin, Worshipful Master of Ku-ring-gai Lodge No. 1033 UGLNSW, and his Brethren were then presented to the WM of Theodore Unmack Lodge and afterward they were invited to

constitute and work a Lodge under their own Constitution, to which they readily agreed. Theodore Unmack Lodge was then declared Closed and un-Tyled.

Lodge Ku-ring-gai was then duly called up to labour under the New South Wales Constitution in the Grand Hall of the United Grand Lodge of Queensland and an historical event was in the making. Lodge Ku-ring-gai conferred a Second degree on Bro. Kerry Jeffers in the presence of the Grand Master of Queensland and in the midst of the grandeur of the beautiful Grand Hall of Queensland Freemasonry; thus creating a landmark in the Masonic life of Bro. Jeffers and his Worshipful Master. The Working were presented to candidate by his son Bro. Andrew Jeffers. A daily advancement in Masonic knowledge for Queensland Freemasons attending this meeting was one of the useful outcomes of this event.

On behalf of Theodore Unmack Lodge, the Grand Master presented the candidate with a gold square and compasses lapel pin and a copy of the booklet "The Life and Times of Theodore Oscar Unmack – Freemason" as mementos of the occasion.

An Irish Festive Board followed where the Brethren were joined by their ladies. Those who wished to indulge shared a Guinness or two while the gathering was entertained with harmony by W.Bro. Don Fenwick singing traditional Irish ballads accompanied by W.Bro. John Henriksen on piano and organ.

RECHAB MASONIC LODGE VISITS LONDON

On the 20th October 2005 a party of 15 Masons and partners left Lisburn to travel to London. This party made up of Brethren from Rechab Masonic Lodge No. 667 and guests. Its purpose was to visit The Ulster Lodge No 2972 working under the English Constitution. Our party was lead by our Worshipful Master V.W.Bro. S Murphy (Provincial Grand Treasurer of Antrim) and included V.W.Bro. J Fraser (Grand Lodge Inner Guard), W.Bro. J A Walker (Provincial Grand Steward of Antrim) and many Past Provincial Officers and Worshipful Brethren of the Lodge.

The Ulster Lodge established by expatriate Ulstermen residing in and around the London area has a long history with Irish Masonry and many of our Principle Officers are Honorary Members of this Lodge. The contact between the Lodges had started some 9 months before the actual visit. On arrival we booked into the hotel and a guided tour of the Grand Lodge Building had been arranged for all the party including partners.

At 5.00 p.m. the Brethren were met and escorted to the Lodge Room where after due testing were invited to join the Ulster Lodge meeting. During this meeting the Ulster Lodge "called off" from labour (break). This enabled Rechab Masonic Lodge, having received agreement from Grand Lodge, to arrange the Lodge Room and then performed an opening and closing under the Irish Constitution. During this time the Worshipful Master of the Ulster Lodge was presented with a Mall and a bottle of 16-year-old Malt Whiskey,
