Grand Master's Address - 2nd October 2010 - Belfast



Since the June Communication, things have been relatively quiet due to few lodges meeting during the summer months. However, I had the pleasure of accepting invitations to visit a few European Grand Lodges, which I found to be most enjoyable and at which I was well received.

On 4th June, my Deputy and I attended an Installation Communication of the Grand Lodge Alpina of Switzerland in Geneva. The main Communication was preceded by a Confirmation of Marriage Vows Ceremony, in the presence of both members and ladies, which involved a recently married Freemason and his new wife. Duggie and I, along with the visiting Brethren, were intrigued by the ritual which was very interesting but one which we would be unlikely to adopt. The main Installation Ceremony went exceedingly well and contained a number of variations which were quite dissimilar to our working.

We were also shown a video about the 'Origin of Freemasonry' which was most professionally displayed on the both sides of the temple, so enhancing the viewing for all present.

I visited Lodge 814 Whiteabbey on 8th June to celebrate the Centenary of the Lodge with the Master and Brethren and later presented R.W.Bro. Cyril Ferguson with his 50 years medal. On the following Sunday, a church service was held at Abbot's Cross to mark 100 years of continuous working.

The Annual Summer Communication of the Provincial Grand Lodge of North Connaught, held on 9th June, proved to be a very pleasant experience. Many Provincial Grand Masters were present and the new Provincial Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Norman Reid treated us exceptionally well. We all had a quiet reflection on the absence of R.W.Bro. George Ginnelly, who was so committed to his work as Provincial Grand Master and gave unselfishly of his time and talents to the promotion of our Order.

On 14th June, I had a very pleasant visit to Carrareagh Lodge No. 374 in North Antrim. The visit was most enjoyable and I was most impressed with the tremendous Masonic spirit which prevailed.

The Provincial Grand Lodge of Londonderry & Donegal held its communication in Donemana on 17th June to celebrate the 200th Anniversary of Donemana Lodge 256. There was a good turnout and the ritual and arrangements were exceptionally well done.

On 18th June, the Grand Secretary and I visited the Grand East of the Netherlands to see their new Grand Master installed. Many foreign delegations attended and the hospitality extended to all was top class.

The Tripartite meeting of the Home Constitutions was held in London on the 14th & 15th July when we held our annual discussions relating to International and domestic Freemasonry.

I attended The Summer Lodge in Dublin on 21st July and congratulate R.W.Bro. Phillip Daley and his team for an excellent day.

August proved to be a rather quiet month with the exception of the Annual Golf Competition for the Grand Master's Cup at Cookstown. The event was most successful and my thanks go to the Golf Committee for all the hard work they put into this event which raises substantial sums for Charity every year.

R.W.Bro. Noel Simpson and his wife Pauline are the backbone of this competition which would not be the same without them and I thank them dearly for the magnificent and selfless effort which they give every year to ensure its success. Two hundred and fifty golfers took part and we were honoured by the presence of a semi-professional golfer, our Deputy Grand Master. He hasn't been seen since and we believe that he is still out on the course looking for his ball!

On 2nd September, I presented and signed a

225 year Anniversary Certificate to St. Columb's Lodge No. 640 at their stated communication as I was unable to attend their formal celebrations.

A very successful 'Open Day' was once again held in Freemasons' Hall, Londonderry on 11th September followed by an invitation to the public, at a later date, to attend an evening function in the hall. Some 300 hundred visitors attended this function and a better understanding of our Order was achieved through presentations about Freemasonry and tours of the building. Congratulations to the Chairman, W.Bro. Trevor Taylor and the Board of Management.

We had a most interesting visit to Stockholm by invitation of the Grand Lodge of Sweden, where only Christians may join. A formal communication was not held as they preserve their secrets most tenaciously, however, they gave us a demonstration of receiving a candidate in the Ist degree from ancient times to the present day when they decided to Christianise their order. The Swedish Order adopted this change through the wishes of Prince Charles of Sweden. Although a formal communication was not held we were treated to a sumptuous banquet which followed the demonstration and at which I was the principal guest.

My recent visit was to the Provincial Grand Lodge of Forfarshire of the Scottish Constitution, in Dundee, when a new Provincial Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Sandy Christie, a good friend of mine, was installed by the Grand Master Mason of Scotland, another good friend. A number of Irish Masons were present and were paraded in with me when I was received and welcomed by the Provincial Grand Master.

Looking forward, I would remind you all of the forthcoming 'Irish Freemasons' Young Musician of the Year Competition' running from $14^{th}-16^{th}$ October in Freemasons' Hall and would appeal to you all for your support. We plan to run this competition each year, for the next five years when we can reassess the financial outcomes and hopefully plan for the future. I anticipate that Grand Lodge profit will grow over that period and will eventually stabilise in 2015 and that our competition will continue into the future.

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The Irish Freemasons Young Musician of the Year 2010

Eamonn Lawlor is a Founder Patron of the Irish Freemasons' Young Musician of the Year. Before joining RTÉ lyric fm when it started in 1999, he was one of Ireland's leading news broadcasters for many years, presenting 'Six One' and 'Prime Time' on RTÉ 1 television. He has now become the most prestigious 'voice of music' on RTÉ *lyric fm*, where he presents a number of flagship music programmes including the regular Friday night RTÉ Symphony Orchestra concerts live from the National Concert Hall. He acted as the Presenter for both the Semi-Finals and Final at Freemasons' Hall on October 14th & 16th. The Final was broadcast in full by RTÉ lyric fm on Monday evening Oct 18th, when it was also introduced by Eamonn Lawlor.

Beneath the gaze of the Grand Masters in their gilded frames, a young saxophonist stepped onto the dais in the Grand Lodge Room on Thursday afternoon and launched into Yoshimatsu's Fuzzy Bird Sonata. Music with a whiff of rock and jazz - a splendid surprise, and the perfect opening for the inaugural competition: the vibrant musicality of Daniel Dunne's performance blowing away any doubts that the event would be all we had hoped for — and more.

Not that our hopes were modest: from the beginning we knew this was an initiative that could not have been more timely. Young musicians are beginning their careers at a particularly difficult time. Music lovers are trimming their sails and thinking twice before buying concert tickets; corporate sponsorship of music has also suffered. Now more than ever we need reminding that today's tickets and today's concerts are not a luxury for the moment, but an investment in the joy of music for the generations of audiences to come. The Irish Freemasons have made that investment — and the return is bound to be great.

In October last year, when Grand Lodge decided to sponsor the competition for a minimum of five years, the groundwork had already been laid. An organizing committee was in place, availing of the expertise and experience of Events GLI; the four Patrons (Dearbhla Collins, Jane Carty, John Rowden and myself) had gladly lent our support. Soon the Music Colleges (The CIT Cork School of Music, Cork; The DIT Conservatory of Music & Drama, Dublin; The Irish World Academy of Music & Dance, University of Limerick and The Royal Irish Academy of Music, Dublin) would be enthusiastic participants, seizing the opportunity to promote their talented students and selecting the eleven semi-finalists.

The inspiration had come from the National Youth Orchestra of Scotland Staffa award, which is supported by the Grand Lodge of Scotland – but there was much to be done to adapt the model to local needs and circumstances. Jane Carty, with her extensive experience of music competitions, was our guide through several potential minefields, such as the rulebook and the recruitment of the jury. Not that Jane thinks in terms of minefields: for her, the rulebook was a means to securing the highest standard of competitor and a well-chosen jury would ensure the credibility of the competition and enhance its value.

I am glad to say that from the start my RTÉ colleagues shared my own enthusiasm for the venture. We were keenly aware that the lapsing of the RTÉ Musician of the Future Competition had left an important gap in our support for music, and the invitation to be associated with the Freemasons' Competition was an opportunity to be seized with both hands. Without hesitation *lyric fm* resolved to broadcast the final; both RTÉ Orchestras offered performance opportunities to the winner, who will also be our nominee for the European Broadcasting Union's New Talent Competition; our Executive Director of Performing Groups served on the inaugural International Jury. So happily has the co-operation turned out this year, we can only hope for it to be renewed and intensified in the Competitions to come.

I have dwelt on those parts of the organization in which I had some involvement – but they were the tip of the iceberg. As the finals approached I saw for the first time the full scale of the operation: jury members flown in and ferried to their hotel rooms, the stage set and lights hung, publicity interviews arranged; rehearsals scheduled, everything following the meticulously detailed production script (modeled on Covent Garden's). Making it happen was a group of organizers so self-effacing that I am asked not to name names, but of whom Grand Lodge should be very proud.

They, together with Joseph Brennan (who sponsored the Brennan Prize in honour of his parents) and all concerned had their reward in the music. The playing by all eleven competitors, by their own accompanists and by competition pianist Dearbhla Brosnan was a triumph – as was the guest recital by Finghin Collins, reminding us of how competition winners build on their success to become even finer musicians.

As we said on the Final night, it was an occasion on which to remember that Mozart was still a youth when he was first helped on his way by the patronage of Freemasons in Vienna. Later, when he became a Mason, his lodge was called 'Beneficence'. He knew how much a young musician is in need of support and beneficence – and he certainly knew a brilliant clarinettist when he heard one. As the Irish Freemasons send Macdára Ó Seireadáin on his way as their Young Musician of the Year 2010, they surely have Mozart's blessing for him, and for their efforts.

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Grand Master's Speech at the Final of the Young Musician Competition

Councillor Murphy, representing The Lord Mayor of Dublin, Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen

Our predecessors, the original operative Masons, were encouraged to study within their Lodges, the 'Seven Liberal Arts and Sciences'. These were: —— Grammar, Rhetoric, Logic, Arithmetic, Geometry, Astronomy and Music.

The study of these Liberal Arts has been handed down and is still a part of our Craft today. It is therefore a very particular pleasure for me that, during my time as Grand Master, it has been possible to institute the Irish Freemasons Young Musician of the Year Competition, which will be evidence for many years to come of our abiding interest in this particular Art.

However, the status of competitions has become somewhat cheapened these days. They are so ubiquitous. "The X Factor", "Dancing on Ice", "Pop Star to Opera Star" where, often with only a few weeks training, someone becomes the 'winner' and is feted as such.

Our competitors over the last few days have not had just a few weeks training. They have been working hard at their chosen profession for years, day in and day out, studying and practicing to reach the high standard we have been privileged to witness in the semi-finals and the finals.

In fact, all these young people are really winners, but to maintain their profession they have many years of hard work before them, which may never stop until they retire.

To them I say, thank you so much for agreeing to take part and I hope that it has not been too stressful and has been a rather enjoyable experience.

I know that you all (and particularly our Finalists) are anxious for me to hand over to the Chairman of the Jury so that you can hear their adjudication - but there are some people whom I really must thank and hope you will bear with me for a little while longer. There is one group of people without whom this competition would never have got off the ground - our Patrons, namely; Jane Carty, Dearbhla Collins, Eamonn Lawlor and John Rowden.

Without the slightest hesitation they freely gave us every assistance they possibly could, to the absolute utmost of their very considerable expertise. We shall be forever indebted to them all.

The status of any competition is, to a huge extent, influenced by the status of those who adjudicate it: Professor Carol-Dawn Reinhart, Mr. Seamus Crimmins, Mr. Martin Loveday, Monsieur Dominique Merlet and Maestro Robin Stapleton, our Jury, who are all pre-eminent in their field and, as a consequence, very busy and sought after people.

I am grateful indeed to them that they felt able, within their very

tight schedules, to agree to bring their expertise to bear on our Competition here.

The selection for the semi-final was made by the Music Colleges themselves, namely;

The Royal Irish Academy of Music in Dublin;
The DIT Conservatory of Music and Drama in Dublin;
The CIT School of Music in Cork;
The Irish World Academy of Music and Dance in Limerick.

We are privileged to have the Heads of those Colleges here with us tonight. Thank you so much for agreeing to participate in our Competition. I hope this will be the first of a long and fruitful cooperation between us as the Competition goes on from year to year.

We have received splendid cooperation from RTÉ and RTÉ *lyric fm*, hand in hand with the RTÉ National Symphony Orchestra and the RTÉ Concert Orchestra, both of whom who have offered a future engagement to the winner. It is very good to have such support from our National Broadcaster and I thank you wholeheartedly.

Everyone making a speech states the next sentence which I am going to use. "Of course, events like this don't run themselves'. There is no other way to put it. The events of this week are the culmination of months of work not only by our Patrons, but by the staff here at Grand Lodge and an Operations team of Events GLI, which includes both Freemasons and non-Masons alike. There are too many to name individually and I suspect that they would not want this anyway, as they consider it a team effort. But please, both individually and collectively, accept my thanks and my appreciation for the professional way everything has been organized.

Please make sure you have next year's dates in your diary – we shall need you again!!

Ladies and Gentlemen, you will be familiar with the words of Yeats:

'I have spread my dreams under your feet

Tread softly for you tread on my dreams.'

These young people, who have performed so beautifully for us have indeed spread their dreams under our feet. We must tread softly and nurture them carefully. They are our future!

The IIth Annual Grand Master's Millennium Cup Competition organised by the Freemasons of Ireland Golfing Society was held at the Killymoon Golf Club, Cookstown on Friday 27th August 2010.

Once again, this popular competition continues to attract growing numbers of Masons, Non-Masons and Ladies from all over Ireland, Scotland, England, Finland and the Isle of Man. This year we had a Masonic Brother, from Germany, Professor Rolf Kalff, Head of Neurosurgical Department Friedrich Schiller University Jena, having seen the entry on the Grand Lodge Web-Site. Rolf enjoyed the competition and hospitality so much he hoped to come back next year and bring a few others.

The weather was excellent for golf, and with a magnificent array of prizes to the value of £1,500; 234 competitors enjoyed the pleasant conditions and returned some excellent scores.

The winner of the Grand Master's Cup was Ken Taylor, of Carareagh Lodge No. 374 (Masonic Province of Antrim), with 42 Stableford points.

The Team Prize was won by Trevor Bownes and Wesley Hutton representing Victory Masonic Lodge No. 459 in the Province of Tyrone and Fermanagh with a combined score of 82.

Best gross was won by Killymoon Secretary Manager Norman Weir with an excellent score of 76 gross.

The prize for the best overseas visitor was carried off by Timo Sankari from Finland.

Ladies prizes were won by Ann Teggarty, May Baxter and Diana McClelland.

Non-Mason's prizes were won by Dave Pollock, Ken Nesbitt, and Glynn Reese.

The day concluded with a great evening of entertainment and prize-giving, well attended by approximately 100 people which included the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Assistant Grand Master, and Provincial Grand Masters and Officers from the Northern Provinces together with their Partners.

The prizes were presented by the Grand Master, M.W.Bro. George Dunlop.

Tributes were paid to the organisers of the event, R.W.Bro. Noel Simpson and his wife, Pauline, and the organising Committee. The Committee would especially thank The Captain, Council and Members of Killymoon Golf Club for their hospitality, the Caterers and the ground staff for having the course in excellent condition. Also, to the many Sponsors who donated a large number of very valuable prizes which were on display on all the tee boxes on the golf course and display boards in the Clubhouse.

The competition raised in excess of £6,000 in aid of Masonic and non-Masonic charities. A cheque for £3,000 was presented to Emma Gibson, Coordinator for the R.N.L.I, by the Chairman of the Northern Provinces Committee, R.W.Bro. Richard Gray, Provincial Grand Master of the Masonic Province of Down.

History of the Masonic Boys' School

You will know that the Masonic Girls and Masonic Boys Benevolent Funds continue to provide support for the education of children of our deceased and deserving Brethren at schools throughout Ireland. These Funds were established following the closure of the Masonic Girls' and Boys' Schools in 1972 and 1980, respectively.

The history of the Boys' School, up to its centenary in 1967, is set out in J.F. Burns' book 'Shop Window to the World'. This year, the Masonic Old Boys' Association commissioned a further book on the Boys' School, covering the period 1967 - 1980, and this deals comprehensively with life at the School during those final years and, particularly, with events surrounding the decision to close the School and how the Order managed that difficult situation.

It is intended that the book will be available in March 2011. The two Masonic Schools, which were highly regarded throughout Ireland, were an outward and visible sign of the Order's fraternal benevolence for well over a century and represented a very significant part of the charitable aspect of Irish Freemasonry. You may, therefore, find this book interesting reading. If you would be interested in acquiring a copy (the price has not yet been determined, but it is likely to be inexpensive) perhaps you would let me know, so that I can advise the Masonic Old Boys' Association.

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Bro. Peter Finlay Malpas POW Freemason and Survivor

On 17th July 2010 the Worshipful Master and members of Shamrock Lodge No. 712 celebrated Bro. Peter's ninety-first birthday at Delaney's Irish Restaurant, Wanchai Hong Kong, a favourite navy personnel watering hole when ashore.

Peter's father, James Malpas OBE RNR was a Lt. Commander during WW II and served during the black days when British merchant ships were under repeated attack by German submarine wolf flocks. Bro. Peter entered the war in 1941 and was an engineer aboard a tanker 'The Athelking' when his ship was attacked by the famous German raider 'The Atlantis'. The raider sank the 'Athelking' killing the Captain and some crew members. After being fished out of the drink by the Atlantis crew, he was transferred to a captured cargo prize ship and offloaded to a POW camp in Mogadishu and then to Merca Italian Somaliland. He just survived this incarceration until the camp was liberated by South African forces, from the cruiser 'HMS Ceres' and was sent to Aden suffering from malaria and dengue fever and eight months in hospital where he nearly died of typhoid. The old war horse was far from being finished and soon went back to sea and into the thick of it again. In 1949 the frigate, 'HMS Amethyst', steamed up the Yangtze River to relieve the guard ship 'HMS Consort' at Nanking, prepared to evacuate British and Commonwealth citizens caught up in the advance of the Chinese Communist Forces.

The Amethyst came under fire from Communist shore batteries yet the ship steamed on and was attacked again by batteries around Xou An Reach and Rose Island where she took three direct hits. Amethyst was hit again by two shells that struck the bridge wounding the Amethyst's Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Commander Bernard Skinner. Skinner died from his injuries a day later. In the confusion that followed, the ship ran aground off Rose Island. The ship received over 50 hits and holes below the waterline plugged with hammocks.

Peter was an engineer on board another tanker the 'Green Ranger' at the time and was ordered to bunker the 'HMS Amethyst' during the Yangtse Incident, as the Amethyst had insufficient fuel. The

'Green Ranger' laden with fuel was fired upon and ordered by the navy to "get the hell out of it"! Peter's tanker then sailed down the Yangtse to wait for the frigate at the mouth of the river.



Finally Lt. Cdr. Kerans made a break for open waters on July 31st under cover of darkness, the Amethyst slipped her cable and proceeded down stream to begin the 104-mile dash for freedom running the gauntlet of Communist guns on both banks of the river.

After the 'Amethyst' arrived at the mouth of the Yangtse river she was given sufficient fuel by the 'Green Ranger to sail for Hong Kong. The frigate then entered Hong Kong harbour where the ship was received with rapturous acclaim. The Commodore extended his congratulations to the Green Ranger too. The tanker also received Battle Honours for its support to the frigate.

A FIRST FOR LODGE NO. 41 LARNE

The W. Master then presented each widow with a "Broken Column Brooch" and proceeded to explain the origins of the brooch which dates back to the American Civil War. It was first used for the ladies of Masons who were at war. As so many men did not return, the ladies continued to wear the brooch and it became accepted as a Masonic Widows Brooch throughout North America and Canada. It was first introduced into England by a member of the Earl of Chester Lodge No. 1565.

He went on to explain that this brooch was created to symbolise the Order's continued concern for and honour the Widows of Brother Masons whose names added lustre to the Craft and hoped they would wear it with great pride.

In reply, one of the widows Olivia Nash, also known as "Ma" from the BBC Television series "Give my head peace", paid a warm tribute to the Order in general and Lodge 41 in particular in relation to the assistance she had received following the death of her late husband. Her daughter, Mrs. Patricia Curran who was present, also spoke of the high esteem in which she held the Order and how three generations of her family had been assisted in various ways, pointing out that she might not have enjoyed the education she had received without the help of the Lodge.

The Brethren and their guests then retired to a function room where a light supper was provided and a convivial evening was enjoyed by all.

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Past Grand Master's Standard



The sun was still shining vigorously, and there remained a bit of warmth in the air, when the first of the National Museum staff trundled up the steps at 4.30 p.m. "Can you not read?" says I; "We don't open till 5". "But sure we're open ourselves then", says she; "Can we not have a look round now?" Magnanimously, we threw open the doors on the spot; and we did not manage to lock bar and bolt those self same doors until 10.45 that night.

Yes, Culture Night had arrived in the Capital once again, and with coloured balloons tied to the polished rails on the steps, we signalled Freemasons' Hall participation in this annual event. This involved a large number of institutions, over 130 in all, - museums, libraries, galleries etc. - opening their portals on Friday evening, 24th. September to the denizens of Dublin and beyond.

We had expected a fair few visitors over the evening, attracted, as usual, by simple curiosity, but we had no idea just how many. We soon did however as there formed, quite literally, a queue of people from the very outset until our forced closing at 9.30, when the building was completely full and it would have been unwise to allow more in.

Our in-house guides, one to a room, were on their feet and describing, discussing and detailing their areas for five and a half hours, without a break - take a bow Morgan McCreadie (who managed two rooms, actually), Daniel Stanford and Keith Stent - your collective dedication in the circumstances could not have been bettered.

The front of House was patrolled in enthusiastic fashion by Paddy Fennell and Cristina Eremia, who greeted the visitors and handed to each a one-page description of the Hall and rooms; and the treasures in the Museum were manfully guarded, and explained, by no less a personage than our own Chairman of the Metropolitan Board. The whole thing was masterminded and organised by the Curator and Archivist Rebecca Hayes, and to say that she did a superb job would be a complete understatement. The Grand Secretary was also in attendance and ate most of the sandwiches. Philip Daley ate the rest.

The visitors generally, expressed awe at the scale and style of the building, most having no conception whatever of the size of the place before entering. The feedback was very encouraging and positive, and the usual challenging questions got a good airing - can women join?; why not?; why do men join? what do you do in a meeting? how many politicians are members? etc. etc. The more bizarre queries that we occasionally encounter surfaced also - are you part of the world-wide Jewish conspiracy? do you control the Bank of Ireland?, is it all witchcraft and mumbo-jumbo?

According to the following day's Irish Times, the Hall proved to be one of the most popular venues of the evening (We believe we had over three thousand people in) and for the successful handling of that we must applaud the Curator and her extraordinarily hardworking crew - perfectly well done gang, and don't worry - next year we will have replacements to hand, and you can all have a sandwich!
