## **Grand Master Installation**

On Friday 28<sup>th</sup> November 2014 the Grand Lodge of Ireland Installed the 44<sup>th</sup> Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Douglas T. Grey. The ceremony took place at Freemasons' Hall, the Grand Lodge Room being filled to capacity. The Grand Masters of 21 Sister Constitutions were

in attendance, with accompanying senior Brethren.

The Assistant Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Rodney McCurley took the chair as Grand Master, and prior to opening Grand Lodge all visiting delegations were received, taking their seats on the dais. Grand Lodge was opened, and Masonic Courtesies were accorded to distinguished guests. The Pro Grand Master of England, M.W.Bro. Peter Lowndes responded on behalf of the visitors, commenting that it was a happy occasion at which we confirm the Masonic unity of our Constitutions.

The Communication being solely for the purpose of Installing the Grand Master, no other business was on the agenda. A procession was formed for the presentation of the Grand Master Elect, the Chair having been taken by R.W.Bro. Michael Ward, Past Senior Grand Warden, Grand Secretary for Instruction, as Installing Officer.

The Grand Master Elect entered Grand Lodge, escorted by W.Bro. Michael Troughton-Smith and W.Bro. Trevor Boate. Having taken the Obligation at the altar, the Grand Master was conducted to the dais, where R.W.Bro. Michael Ward vacated the Throne. The Grand Master was Installed with dignity, and invested with the Chain of Office, borne by V.W.Bro. David Young. The Grand Master's Banner, borne by W.Bro. John Boddy, was unfurled and admired. The banner depicts the Three Castles of Dublin, with a roundel above encircling the Arms of County Leitrim; two silver streams representing the Rivers Liffey and Shannon; the background is St. Patrick's blue.

> The Director of Ceremonies called upon the Brethren to rise, and the newlyinstalled Grand Master was saluted in accordance with Antient Custom. The Grand Master spoke of the honour conferred on him, and his intention of serving the Brethren who had so honoured him to the best of his ability.

> > The next business was the Installation of the Deputy Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Rodney McCurley, who was duly Obligated and Saluted. The Assistant Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Leslie Nixon was likewise Obligated and Saluted.

There being no further Regular business, the Grand Master addressed the Brethren, and made special reference to his pleasure in having such a distinguished gathering from other Constitutions present, wishing all Brethren a pleasant evening at the Banquet.

Grand Lodge closed, and those attending the Banquet proceeded to the Round Room at the Mansion House, the official residence of Dublin's Lord Mayor, where many observed the Three Castles of Dublin emblazoned on the railings and building. A drinks reception preceded the Banquet, and Brethren and Guests sat down to dine.

The Grand Master entered, accompanied by his wife Georgine, and the meal commenced. The evening proved to be informal and enjoyable, a splendid setting in which to re-affirm fidelity to our Fraternity.

## **TLC Northern Committee Quarterly Report**

As we approach the end of the first full 12 month period for actually delivering hospital teddies to emergency departments in the Northern Provinces we are not relaxing. It was a struggle to gain the permissions and acceptance in the hospitals but it has been so worthwhile. Our first and biggest thanks must be to you, the Brethren, and the Lodges, Chapters and other disciplines that have supported us so well. We know that it is not going to get any easier. Along with those in the other areas of our island we require about  $\pounds$ 50,000 per year in total so keep the donations coming. An average of  $\pounds$ 100 per Lodge per annum will totally fund this charity. The stories from the hospitals makes it all the more worthwhile to be involved. We are receiving unsolicited excellent press comment and raising the good profile of our Order as well.

The Friendship Maul continues its travels having gone "below the radar" for a while. Not only is it raising money as it travels but it is introducing people and groups who would not normally have met. It has already led to exchange visits between whole Lodges and a sharing of differing traditions and rituals. Lodges from different areas and Provinces are now in communication with each other. Check the web sites for the current location of the maul - turn up with at least three Brethren from your Lodge and pay a ransom to capture the maul!

As we write this, our Christmas cards are almost sold out and our bears continue to find new owners. The coins or tokens will be along shortly as will the ties and all will be available from 115 The Mount or from any committee member (see list below). There will be some exciting events, open to Masons and Non-Masons and families alike, during 2015.

### After the First Five Years of The Irish Freemasons Young Musician of The Year Competition, Eamonn Lawlor Reflects

It was four years (and five competitions) ago, but it will always seem like yesterday: young Daniel Dunne, our very first semi-finalist, put the saxophone to his lips and seemed to fill the Grand Lodge Room with October sunshine as he began to play the Fuzzy Bird sonata. Our hearts were lifted by the glorious surprise of the music; the Young Musician of the Year Competition already had its defining moment - and a centuries-old tradition was renewed, as Music and Freemasonry sparked off each other once again.

Looking back over the list of competitors from 2010 onwards, I am amazed to find how one performance after another can be clearly remembered. The overall winners, naturally: Macdara Ó Seireadáin, Alexander Bernstein, Iulian Pusca, Alex Petcu-Colan and Gary Beecher. Other top contenders stick in the mind as well: those who might easily have won on another night or in another year. I treasure also in a special way those performances that may have failed to meet the concert-platform standard required of a prizewinner - but which nonetheless sent a true musical shiver down the spine, for their youthful enthusiasm, their courage or their (relatively) 'artless' honesty.

I applaud Grand Lodge for confirming that it will continue the Competition for at least a further two years. The enthusiasm with which the initiative has been endorsed by the music colleges, the young performers and the public, testifies to the real need that it fulfils and the value of its contribution to music in Ireland in these difficult times. It occurs to me, however, that there may be something even greater going on, something more to celebrate, grander aims to keep sight of.

For many of us who might have been unaware (or misled) as to the nobility of Freemasonry's founding ideals, the past five years of this Competition have been a powerful reminder. Those Freemasons who helped the young Mozart and the young Beethoven were supporting music as a practical contribution to the great Enlightenment enterprise, to nurture humanity's higher faculties for the building of a better world.

Despite the cynicism of the early 21<sup>st</sup> century, what a joy to discover that belief in the reforming power of music is not a thing of the past. Venezuela has a quarter of a million young people playing in youth and children's orchestras; young musicians from Israel and Palestine play together in Daniel Barenboim's West-Eastern Divan Orchestra; in both cases a very practical initiative directs the players and their audiences away from conflict and exploitation towards harmony and cooperation: towards the ideal of universal brotherhood which Beethoven celebrated in his Ninth Symphony and which – as I understand it – is at the heart of Freemasonry.

As we mark five years of the Young Musician of the Year we rejoice in the talent it has fostered and the music it has given us. Let us also celebrate it as a timely lesson in human values, an inspired but practical contribution by the Irish Freemasons to the betterment of Irish life.

R.W.Bro Noel Drain also presented a cheque for  $\pounds 2,000$  to R.W.Bro. Richard Gray who received it on behalf of "Teddies for Loving Care (TLC)".

Tributes were paid to the organisers of the event, R.W.Bro. Noel Simpson and his wife, Pauline, and the organising Golf Committee. On behalf of the Golf Committee, The Chairman, V.W.Bro Leslie Graham, thanked The Captain, Council and Members of Killymoon Golf Club for their hospitality, the Caterers and the ground staff for having the course in excellent condition. Also, to the many Sponsors who donated a large number of very valuable prizes which were on display on all the tee boxes on the golf course and display boards in the Clubhouse.

Every year Lodge St. David No. 903 holds a Communication by dispensation away from their home base in Hong Kong. This year the Lodge visited Seoul, Korea, on the weekend of the 31<sup>st</sup> October to the 2<sup>nd</sup> December, 2014. Over the years, these visits have strengthened the ties between the Hong Kong Brethren and the Brethren in the countries visited.This year was no exception.

In Seoul Lodge 903 were hosted by the Brethren of Lodge Han Yang No. 1048 S.C. by permission of the District Grand Master for the Far East of the Grand Lodge of Scotland. Lodge No. 1048 S.C. was consecrated in 1909. Lodge 903 had previously visited Seoul in 2005 when the current Worshipful Master of Lodge 903, W.Bro. Philip Wong, was initiated. This return to Seoul was, therefore, a very meaningful occasion for him.

The Brethren travelled to Seoul from Hong Kong over several days, but by Friday evening everyone was present in time for a welcome dinner of local food in Itaewon, the famous entertainment district of the city. It was Halloween, so the streets were lively. Following dinner the Brethren retired for a few glasses of cheer before turning in.

## What's in a Name?

Some will have seen a plaque on the wall below the clock in Freemasons' Hall, the plaque has the names of 15 former pupils of the Masonic Boys School listed as killed in the Great War.

Perhaps you have wondered who they were, where did they come from, what were their ages, where did they serve and die or perhaps you have never given them much thought.

All were at our school and have since lain for most of 100 years and perhaps with the passing of time have been forgotten. I decided to research each one and bring back at least recognition of who they were and the sacrifices they made. I will publish my research; meantime here are a few facts of interest.

Of them, one had immigrated to New Zealand. He came back to France with the Auckland Regiment and was killed in 1917. Five others left Ireland for a new life in Canada, enlisted in the Canadian Regiments and died in France. The rest, to a man, volunteered for service, mostly in 1914 and were killed in the mud of the trenches in France or the horrors of Gallipoli, with the Royal Dublin Fusiliers.

Another, a Pilot (aged 22) with 45 Squadron Royal Flying Corps, was shot down and his body never recovered.

The brothers Lionel and Percy Carleton from Delvin, Co. Westmeath, left Ireland for Canada with their widowed mother Charlotte in 1914. They enlisted in Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. Lionel was killed in France in June 1916 aged 28. His brother Percy tragically was killed aged 26 in France on 10<sup>th</sup> November 1918, the last full day of the War.

Many Lodges have Rolls of Honour recording the men of 1914-1918, those who died and those who came home. In this Centenary year marking the start of The Great War, your Lodge might like to remember and pay tribute to those gallant men and the sacrifices they made.

Did you know that men about to go on active service in France or elsewhere or home on leave, often received all of their Degrees in one day? Athlone was a garrison town and Lodge 101 Athlone in an old Minute Book has records of such Degrees being given.

A little research is not difficult using a half a dozen websites and gives surprising results. Who knows, you may get a Candidate or two from descendents of those men.

## Teddies day trip to Ballymena






