

# The Lodge of Fidelity No. 125

## 175th Anniversary

This year the Lodge of Fidelity No. 125 proudly celebrates its 175th Anniversary. The Warrant for the Lodge was issued on the 20th November 1837, a year that heralded a momentous period in World affairs, being the Coronation year of Queen Victoria. These were exciting times for the formation of a new Lodge, the founding Brethren embraced the enthusiasm of the Victorian age and their Masonic activities with a vigour and so laid the solid foundation upon which this Lodge still flourishes today.

Fidelity was not the first Lodge to hold this Warrant, it appears that it was in existence almost one hundred years earlier with an unknown Lodge in either 1741 or 1742. During the Napoleonic era it was reissued as a Military Warrant to the 5th Garrison Battalion then based in Cork in 1808. This Battalion had been drawn from two Scottish Militias, the 26th Regiment of Foot (later to become the Cameronians) and the 42nd Royal Highland Regiment of Foot (later to become The Black Watch). The Warrant was returned in 1814 when the Battalion was disbanded. It then returned to Cork in 1817 and was somewhat controversially issued to a new Lodge in Ballincollig.

The Munster Brethren of the time did not appreciate the granting of an old Warrant to a new Lodge, this Lodge only survived until 1833. The current chapter in the history of Warrant 125 is happily one of longevity.

The Brethren were inveterate diners in those Victorian times, when there was a separate dinner account for cigars and chocolates. They were not slow to castigate the caterers when standards did not meet their expectations and accordingly they frequently dined in the Hotel Metropole. Summer picnics in June became a popular part of the Lodge's social calendar, no doubt arising from Queen Victoria's fondness for them, where in accordance with Victorian etiquette, the Brethren waited upon their Ladies. They also held an Annual Summer Supper, the preferred venues being in Howth and Malahide.

The names of the founding Fathers of the Lodge, read like a who's who of Dublin's Victorian Society, to mention just a few;- John Ringland M.D., Master of the Coombe Hospital, Sir Charles A. Cameron C.B., President of the College of Surgeons etc., who later joined Lodge No. 2 and became Deputy Grand Master and whose portrait hangs in the Grand Lodge Room, Sir Robert Sexton, Alderman in the City

of Dublin, Sir Robert Jackson, Sir Thomas F. Brady the Commissioner of Fisheries who once brought 400,000 Salmon Ova to New Zealand by ship, Charles Eason the founder of Eason's Bookshops, Major Laurence E. Knox the founder of the Irish Times, Judge William Keogh and John Graham Purser the "Founding Father" of the Lodge of Research 200.



In 1997 the Lodge made the inspired decision to "Twin" with Harmony Masonic Lodge No. 228 in Gorey. A close and harmonious relationship had built up between the Brethren of the two Lodges over the preceding years and this has grown in strength since then. Today the two Lodges exchange very pleasant visits on a regular basis and support each other's activities.

There is a noticeable "Buzz" about the Lodge activities and Festive Boards in this 175th celebration year. Some new Brethren have joined and are enjoying our fellowship. A very successful Bottle Auction was held in March to raise funds for the Charities.

On Friday 16th November 2012 the Lodge will hold its Ladies Night which will be an ideal opportunity to celebrate its 175th year in Bewleys Hotel in Ballsbridge, a fitting location for such an event, as the venue is steeped in Masonic tradition as it was formally the "The Masonic Girls School". An enjoyable night is planned and we will have as entertainment, Ladies Quiz, a Monster Raffle and we plan to launch the newly researched and printed History of the Lodge.

Our Secretary W. Bro. James Gibson would be delighted to hear from any friends or Brethren who would like to join us in Bewleys on the 16th November on what promises to be a memorable evening.

## *Introducing the New Assistant Grand Master*



At the October Communication of Grand Lodge, the Grand Master announced the appointment of R.W. Bro. Rodney McCurley as the new Assistant Grand Master. Born in the East end of Belfast, Rodney spent the first 4 years of his life living on the Castlereagh Road, prior to moving to West Belfast, where he was educated at Springfield Public Elementary School. "Life was very different then, sixty years ago. My grandfather was in World War 1 and lived in Earl Craig Crescent and my father was in World War 2 and after the war his work took us to the other side of the city" remembers Rodney. At the age of sixteen Rodney went to work for a computer manufacturing company known as TAB, "It wasn't what I wanted to do and I knew I could never work in a factory, that wasn't my nature, but in those days if you got work you took it." The following year saw the career change he was really looking for and he joined the General Post Office as an apprentice engineer. Staying with the General Post Office throughout his whole working life as it went onto be a public corporation before finally being sold off as British Telecom in the 1980's; he progressed through to management within the organisation, retiring in 2002. Rodney married his wife Mary and moved to Glengormley. In 1974 his father-in-law introduced him into

Freemasonry, Abercorn Masonic Lodge No. 114, in Newtownards Road. There wasn't any previous family tradition of Freemasonry in Rodney's family, so the experience was new to him, although Mary had grown up knowing the routine and adapted successfully to Rodney's Masonic Career. Being nominated for Provincial honours by his Lodge, Rodney took the office of Provincial Grand Lodge Sword Bearer in 1992; following that, he went onto become a Lodge Inspector, which he enjoyed thoroughly. Serving as a Lodge Inspector, Rodney was approached to become Provincial Grand Lodge Secretary in 2000; before progressing to Provincial Assistant Grand Master in 2006. Then in 2008, when R.W. Bro. Richard Gray was promoted to Provincial Grand Master, Rodney was invited to become Provincial Deputy Grand Master. The week following the funeral of the past Assistant Grand Master, Rodney was preparing to make a trip to Chicago to visit his son, when he received the call from the Grand Master to ask him to become the next Assistant Grand Master. "After getting up from the floor, I asked if I could take time to think it over and give a response following my holiday. I always like to be sure I'm doing the right thing and don't like to take a job without knowing what it entails. Ambition is not the driving force of my Masonic career, being useful and competent are much more important." added Rodney. On being asked what he considered to be a highlight of his life within Freemasonry, he said that it was probably the Grand Master's Festival. Raising £600,000 for charity, by the Brethren, was a tremendous achievement and being a part of that was a privilege. Continuing the work with the Charities as Assistant Grand Master is something he shall relish and is looking forward to. The new Assistant Grand Master was installed at Freemasons' Hall, Dublin on St. John's Day, following which he visited his Mother Lodge in Newtownards Road, before beginning any other of his official duties, for which we wish him health and happiness.

It was the first crop ever farmed by ancient civilisations in Mesopotamia, leading to a cascade of inventions, the wheel, the plough, irrigation, the written language, arithmetic and accounting. It effectively started the world's agricultural revolution. It helped build the Pyramids, it saved millions of lives during the Middle Ages. It's at the foundation of modern science and germ theory, it was the reason Louis Pasteur discovered pasteurisation (he was investigating why beers sometimes went off, not milk!) it's even the reason behind the invention of the modern fridge sitting in your kitchen! So if you'd like to learn a little about the ancient and important art of craft brewing and modern

Craft Beers, why not bring a friend or two and come along for an entertaining and educational night in the hall and have the chance to sample some history in a glass or two. 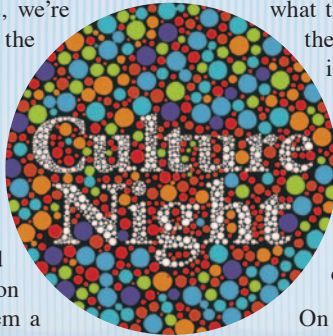

Sunday 9th October 2011. It's 4.45 in the early morning. All the buildings except two are dark and deserted. The night lights of the foyer of Buswells Hotel barely penetrate the gloom. Only Freemasons' Hall is ablaze with light on the first and ground floors.

The second year of the Irish Freemasons Young Musician of the Year had ended at midnight on Saturday and brilliant young pianist Alexander Bernstein has been sent off into the night, warmly congratulated by The Grand Master and the whole audience, proudly clutching his Certificate and cheque. Everyone else, discussing what was to be described the following week by the Sunday Business Post as 'a superb competition of very high standard', had gone off to their homes well satisfied with a wonderful evening of music.

The united aim of everyone is to produce over the Semi-Finals and Finals of the competition, what we call "one hundred minutes of magic" in wonderful surroundings, with a welcome, which reflects well on Freemasonry. Feedback received shows that we are achieving this and it is building year on year.

The whole process starts as soon as the previous year has ended with a review meeting, the Chairman of the Jury, one of our Patrons, Mrs Jane Carty, writes to the Music Colleges to

confirm that they wish to enter semi-finalists for the following year. So far every Music College in Ireland awarding third level degrees in Music Performance has nominated entrants except Queens University Belfast, which although asked, have so far declined our invitation to participate.

welcoming is therefore extremely important.



Saturday is the culmination. The RTÉ sound engineers arrive and set up their equipment to record the Final for broadcasting by RTÉ Lyric fm two days later as 'The Lyric Concert'. The four finalists, very nervous, await their call. Patron, Eamonn Lawlor, as the presenter for the evening goes to the microphone and welcomes the audience, and introduces the Jury, and then the first finalist. The Final has started. Downstairs the work carries on – but very quietly – preparing the main dining rooms for the Grand Master's Reception. The other finalists pace up and down silently in their dressing room awaiting their call, or nervously tune and retune their instrument.

The Grand Master hosts a Post-Competition reception, and this again provides a valuable

opportunity to promote Freemasonry to people with influence in Ireland. Conversation is easy as the subject is of course the results of the competition. Did you get it right? Did you have the same order? I thought "xxxx" was going to win!

The time drifts towards midnight, and guest start to wander from the building. Slowly the room empties, and the fatigue on some of the faces of the people who have been there all day is beginning to show. Farewell is said to the last guests as they go to their cars.

Saturday, 13th October 2012, sees this year's Finale of the Young Musician of the Year Competition. Tickets will be available in early September from the Hall Porter's desk.

# New Members Committee

In recent years the volume of enquiries received by the Office and the Grand Lodge website concerning membership of Freemasonry has increased dramatically. All have a very common theme, ‘How do I go about joining?’ and ‘Do I have to know someone?’ being the most commonly asked questions. It became apparent that there are a significant number of potential candidates who are genuinely interested in Freemasonry and may make excellent Masons and, in the absence of any information about joining, their only option is to email us or, in the case of the bolder ones, to call in and ask.

In December 2010 under the authority of the Grand Secretary’s office, a “new members committee” was formed. This committee is made up of W. Bro. Morgan McCreadie, Assistant to the Grand Secretary, V.W. Bro. Peter Fellows McCully, W. Bro. Daniel Stanford and Bro. Keith Stent. The task was seemingly simple; to meet these potential Masons, and pass those with a genuine interest in the Craft to Lodges for Scrutineering. The following is the mission statement of the Committee.

- i) The Committee is not in favour of the “get ‘em in and sign ‘em up quick” policy that could prove to be disastrous. All applicants have been in contact with the Committee for at least six months prior to a letter recommending them to a Lodge. The applicant will have been given at least one tour of Freemasons’ Hall which incorporates a Question and Answer session with W. Bro. McCreadie, W. Bro. Stanford and Bro. Stent, and will also have met with one of the aforesaid on at least one other occasion.
- ii) It is NOT the purpose of the Committee to pass applicants as suitable for Freemasonry. That is the duty of the Lodges themselves, and ultimately, of the various Metropolitan and Provincial Committees of Inspection,

and we would suggest that extra care is required when Scrutineering. The Committee would appreciate feedback from Lodges on all applicants, successful or not.

Since its foundation the New Members Committee has recommended over 40 gentlemen to Lodges. Of these over half are now members of Lodges in Dublin, Wicklow and Wexford and Counties Down and Antrim. Some of the others are awaiting Ballot and to be passed at the appropriate Committees of Inspection. Those who are passed to the Provinces are parties who have emailed us through the Grand Lodge website. So far we have had excellent feedback from all the Lodges which have initiated candidates and that feedback is one of the most important parts of the process. The New Members Committee relies on Lodges to tell it how a candidate is progressing.

Those applicants who have been initiated or are currently going through the scrutineering process are from a wide range of cultural backgrounds, ages and occupations. Military historians, archaeologists, salesmen, students and musicians from Ireland and indeed from a range of Countries in and outside of Europe. The Committee takes great care in suggesting gentlemen to Lodges and is particularly concerned that these men suit the requirements of Freemasonry and that they will suit that particular Lodge they are referred to.

There are currently 23 applications being reviewed at April and May’s New Members’ Committee meeting and a further 15 who are due to come in and meet with us. We look forward to hearing from the Lodges who have helped future generations of Masons into the Craft and to meeting many more.



# Metropolitan Golf Outing

It has come to the attention to the Metropolitan Board of General Purposes that many Lodges who traditionally organised their own Annual Golf Outings are no longer doing so. This has happened due to a wide variety of reasons. The Board has decided to organise a Metropolitan

# Knight Masonry in Dublin

The Metropolitan Area contains six Councils of Knight Masons (a large concentration!). The Great Chief's Council was among the first Councils to be formed in 1923. Great Chief's Council holds a position similar to that of the Grand Master's Lodge or the Grand Master's Royal Arch Chapter. Babylon Council No. 6 is one of the largest Councils on the Roll, having extensive international membership. Media Council No. 13 is a very lively and friendly group, both in Council and at its Festive Board. Cyrus Council No. 29 recently celebrated its 75th anniversary and is enjoying much increased attendances. Darius Council No. 38 is currently instituting a programme for the immediate development of the Council. Sassena Council No. 33, as the name suggests, has a substantial membership from England, drawn from the ranks of the famous Military Lodge, Glittering Star No. 322. Council 33 meets in Dublin twice a year and no visitor will leave dissatisfied.

Knight Masonry has much to offer the active Freemason, its elaborate and colourful Ceremonies and Degrees representing allegorically the building of the Second Temple by a Prince of the House of Judah. This branch of the Order is also known for its friendly hospitality to strangers, as well as its lively and informal Festive Board.

Knight Masonry thrives in many areas outside Dublin, and it is hoped that Metropolitan Knight Masonry can build a firm structure of Masonic, Chivalric friendship. To this end, Grand Council is informally considering possibilities which could encourage greater participation and cooperation between Metropolitan Councils. Ideally, a group could be formed, drawn from both the more experienced Sir Knights and from the active, more recently created Sir Knights. The aim of the group would be to provide a forum for discussion of development within the area.

One suggestion which could be considered is the viability of a "Summer Council". The aim is not to reproduce the very successful Summer Lodge, but instead to draw on the experience of the Craft in arranging events which are both Masonic and social. While no immediate plans are in place, initially a Summer Council may be a modest event; all Metropolitan Knight Masons may meet under a Warrant in the Grand Council Chamber (or elsewhere if the numbers demand). The meeting, to which a guest speaker may be invited, may be followed by an informal Festive Board.

Knight Masonry is increasing in membership along with the Craft, and every Knight Mason is encouraged to promote interest in this Chivalric Order.
