On September 14th W Bro Tony Mansfield will be installed as Master of the Lodge of St John, 151 years and four months after his great, great grandfather, William Mansfield, was installed as its first master by W Bro W. Donald, the Deputy District Grand Master at that time.

It is very likely that this is a unique event in the story of English Freemasonry on the South Island and W Bro Tony, a member and Past Master of the Prince of Wales Lodge no 1338, is to be applauded for taking on this role despite being a resident of Auckland.

William Mansfield had been initiated into the Irish Constitution's Lodge of St John No. 88 and went on to remain in office as Master of 1137 for three years and four months.

He started his working life in Dunedin and was then posted to Fiji. Subsequently his work took him to London, Abu Dhabi and Zambia before returning to these shores in 1993. He has lived and worked in Auckland since then, mainly in healthcare.

Tony was Initiated into Lodge Itawa No. 7072 in Ndola, Zambia in 1988, joined Falcon Lodge No. 7510 in 1990 when transferred to Lusaka, Zambia. On his return to New Zealand he joined the Prince of Wales Lodge No. 1338 in 2007, served as Master 2011/12. Appointed DGJD (North Island) 2014, he is also a member of Royal Arch, Rose Croix, Mark and Royal Ark Mari-

The significance of this event is reflected by the planned attendance of the NI District Grand Master, District Officers and representatives from up to 14 NI English Lodges. In all some 26 Freemasons will be travelling to Timaru from across the Cook Strait that will also include members of the Scottish Constitution.

BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES

It was a criticism from some of the brethren. I hope this satisfies those who had a query who attended the Communications weekend Forum in May last that there has been no feedback or summary of the meeting of the Board of General Purposes. I pointed out that it was expected for Board members to report back to their respective lodges. At a previous meeting of the Board when a question was raised on this subject by Wor. Bro. Van Zoggel, the District Grand Master replied "....the members are not on the Board to represent their lodges but to represent the Board to their lodges." So there is an onus on the Board attendees to report back.

However, I acknowledge that sometimes there is many a slip twixt cup and lip so I will summarise the meeting as follows but without the inclusion of general administration items:

WBro. Van Zoggel is still in the process of completing the Facebook project.

Provisional costs were presented the Treasurer for the 2017 visit to London for the 300th anniversary for those brethren who wish to attend. At the moment 30 brethren and/or partners have expressed a firm interest. If more decide to go then the cost could come down.

The Treasurer reported that the year-end accounts showed an approximate \$3000.00 overspend but that this an anomaly which occurs every two years or so and usually comes back on course the next year. These anomalies included a pledge to NZC for EC lodges supporting the Gallipoli 100th anniversary.

There was a letter and photograph from a Timaru family for the District's tendered support for a special insulin machine for their grandson which, in the event, was paid for by the Health Department and our cheque returned.

W Bro Taylor reported that the new issue of Degrees South was available and he asked for contributions from lodges, together with photographs, for future issues.

In my past role now of DGMentor I presented a brochure including a DVD intended for prospective candidates and a package of these were given to a member of each lodge for return to the lodge secretary. Also included was a format recruiting poster to be used locally for and by each lodge.

I stated that District can no longer afford to ignore any apathy and a recruitment drive by all lodges must start now. At future Board meetings each lodge representative will be asked to report on their recruitment activities.

District Grand Lodge officers should wear 'undress' regalia when attending non-District events and to avoid extra cost in obtaining these we are requesting all lodges to check their store rooms to see if they have any in the old regalia cases or wherever.

RECRUITMENT **FEEDBACK**

At the May meeting of the Board of General Purposes the outgoing District Grand Mentor delivered an address summarising his time in the office.
