But the Charge continues: "... Remember that at this altar you have promised to befriend and relieve every Brother who shall need your assistance. You have been enjoined to remind a Brother in the most friendly manner of his fault, to endeavor to aid his reformation, and to defend his character..." FREEMASONRY A WAY OF LIFE

One of the Ancient Landmarks of Freemasonry is that it will not solicit new members. A man seeking Masonic membership must do so of his free will and accord. Freemasonry does not permit its

members to invite others to join because it believes that a man who becomes a Mason of his own personal desire is much more likely to become a strong and beneficial member.

Freemasonry is not a religion, nor is it a substitute for religion. It provides no system of faith, offers no sacraments, and does not claim to lead to salvation. Every member is free to follow the Faith or Denomination which best agrees with his personal religious conviction and is encouraged to do so.

Masonry expects its members to conduct themselves in accordance with a strict moral code, and it believes the requirements of that moral code are in harmony with the teachings of any religion or with the beliefs of any good man.

Today Freemasonry is a Fraternal society whose members are linked together by a common moral uprightness and whose ethical principles are acceptable to all good men. Its doors are open to all men who seek harmony with each other, who feel a desire for self improvement and who wish to participate in the adventure of making this world a better place to live.

Some Thoughts on Thanksgiving

To some, Thanksgiving is a day off from work. Others think of it as a day when they (usually she) will have to spend a long time in a hot kitchen. Fortunately, many realize that we do have much to be thankful for. And, most, here in the U.S., know it as the fourth Thursday in November. But it wasn't always that date. And the reasons to be thankful are many. Some express their thanks in words, and some by action. Of the words, the following is a sample.

I do, therefore, invite my fellow-citizens, in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea, and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens.

This article first appeared in the "Tanana Valley Masonic News". The author is the wife of Brother Don Chaffin, Worshipful Master elect of Fairbanks Lodge No. 12.)

The Third Annual Wardens' Charge was held in Anchorage the weekend of Sept. 23-25, 1994. Since Don and I had missed last year's event, we were determined not to miss this one, and so off we went to Anchorage. Led once again by Marty Martinez and Vern Wertz, the Charge was a wonderful learning experience and an excellent opportunity to reestablish the bonds created from the first Charge - and forge new ones with those newcomers of this year. A big "Thank You" goes out to Marty and Vern for their impressive effort and their willingness to share their knowledge and expertise with all of us.

The sessions that we had together, as well as the split meetings throughout the weekend, were packed with valuable information and afforded some great brainstorming activity. Becky Dunbar led the women's group through sessions that covered everything from personal feelings about Masonry to important issues such as solutions to dwindling membership and beefing up family participation within the Masonic fold. An extra (and most welcome) bonus was a panel discussion put together by Becky, that included several representatives from different Masonic organizations. Eastern Star, Amaranth, DeMolay, Ladies' Oriental Shrine, Rainbow and Job's Daughters were all represented quite well, for the purpose of informing those of us who had not yet been exposed to these groups. We had a lively question and answer discussion, and everyone came away from that meeting with a solid, positive perspective about Masonic support. Becky did a wonderful job leading the women through the weekend, and I was very impressed with her intelligence, warmth and wit.

Once again, I attended a Wardens' Charge that gave me even more information than the one I attended two years ago, and re-fueled my enthusiasm for full involvement in the Masonic family. Our challenge was to support our husbands when they take their seat in the East as Master of their lodges; to do everything possible to make their year an important one, bring the families of our brothers and sisters closer together and spread the word about the wonder that is Masonry - the love and caring, the values learned and the closeness to God that we all strive for. As wives and helpmates of Master Masons, we have much power at our disposal that we have but touched lightly upon. Our men know the intricate lessons found in Masonry; they practice every day, and they pattern their lives accordingly.

You will come away with renewed purpose, better prepared to handle your year in the East, with fresh ideas and a stronger grasp on the needs of those you are about to guide.

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From Your Editor:

A couple of issues back, we had an article on the "Magna Garter". To keep in touch with history, I'd now like to let you in on the story of the Mayflower Compact. It seems that on November 21, 1620, while the Pilgrim Fathers and Mothers were anchored in Provincetown Harbor after their famous trip to this country, they drew up the Mayflower Compact, which was a short constitution making them a body politic, whereas and notwithstanding. That is, the Pilgrim Fathers did this while the Pilgrim Mothers were busy collecting laundry for the Glorious Wash. The document was signed by forty-one of the seventy-five male passengers, thirteen of the remainder being minors and others who were nobody much. The most minor of all was Oceanus Hopkins, who was born on the way over. Oceanus has received little credit for this feat because Peregrine White arrived a month later and thus qualified as the first white child born in New England. It's pretty late in the day, but three cheers for Oceanus Hopkins! (No, the Mayflower Compact had nothing to do with cosmetics or powdering shiny noses.)

Let's Change Challenges into Opportunities

Leaves are turning. The morning air is crisp. There's even that sprinkling of snow that we Alaskans call "Termination Dust" on the nearby Chugach peaks. Mother Nature is signaling us that changes are imminent. Equally noticeable signs alert us to changes we must make to continue Masonry as a viable and vibrant force in our community, and to resume the leadership role in which we were once so active as a positive influence for the good of all men.

It's no secret that families are in crisis throughout America (and elsewhere throughout the world, as well). Daily, the news sounds an ominous drum-beat of disheartening stories. Children are killing children. Wage earners are losing their jobs. Schools are overcrouded and underfinanced. Family systems, threatened from within and without, are disintegrating. And in an era of limited resources, social service agencies must do more with less.

It is also no secret that Masonry has its own problems. Membership is down. We no longer seem to have the influence we once did when (as just one example) so many of the signers of our Declaration of Independence were members of the Craft. Lodge meetings, in many instances, are poorly attended, and seem less satisfying to those who do come.

So what do we do to respond to such challenges? We grow! And, with growth, we must change!

Yes, there is the dreaded "C" word. But, "change" does not always imply heresy. It can, and in this case does, mean a return to old ways and old glories. As an example, in my own lifetime (and I'm not that old), I remember when the Lodge had major programs involving the entire family. Not just one annual obligatory picnic, but events throughout the year. "Change" also means returning to the position where Masonry was known throughout the community because everyone knew we were there, that we were active, and that we had the best interests of the community at heart. And, finally, "Change" means re-educating our own members about Masonry - its history, its symbolism, and its philosophy - just what it means to be a Mason, and how to really live as a Mason.

So, how do we turn this great Challenge into a golden opportunity?

It has been said that the Chinese character representing the word "Challenge" combines symbols that mean "Danger" and "Opportunity". This ancient insight demonstrates that every challenge offers an "up-side" as well as a "down-side". The "down-side" in our case is the amount of work which will be required to overcome the apathy and lack of information (or actual misinformation) which now seems to prevail. But the "up-side" is the opportunity to work together to work with some of the most knowledgeable and interesting people around. - to work for the good of all men - and to work for the good of Masonry.

Masonic Education programs; Public Schools programs; Community Action programs; Youth Group activities; Masonic Public Relations programs; programs which provide Family Oriented Activities - these (and more) are opportunities whereby the challenges we now face can be met - and overcome.

If only YOU - each one of you - will work together with your Brothers, your Lodge can become that vital force in the community that it once was. And, both you and Masonry will benefit.

When he has learned how to make friends and to keep them, and above all how to keep friends with himself. When he loves flowers, can hunt the birds without a gun, and feels the thrill of an old forgotten joy when he hears the laugh of a little child. When he can be happy and high-minded amid the meaner drudgeries of life. When star-crowned trees, and the glint of sunlight on flowing waters, subdue him like the thought of one much loved and long dead. When no voice of distress reaches his ears in vain, and no hand seeks his aid without response. When he finds good in every faith that helps any man to lay hold of divine things and sees majestic meanings in life, whatever the name of that faith may be. When he can look into a wayside puddle and see something beyond mud, and into the face of the most forlorn fellow mortal and see something beyond sin. When he knows how to pray, how to love, how to hope. When he has kept kept faith with himself, with his fellow man, with his God; in his hand a sword for evil, in his heart a bit of song - glad to live, but not afraid to die. Such a man has found the only real secret of Masonry, and the one which it is trying to give to all the world."
