#### **Grand Masters Message**

Lodge Attendance

During my 4 years in the Grand Lodge line, the



Attendance" has been talked about a lot. While there are some lodges that are doing OK with their attendance, many are not. I once read a study done by a group concerning attendance in clubs, groups etc. The study concluded that only about 10 to 12 percent of the membership participates in the regular

meetings. The others are just card carrying members. The Masonic family is no different with a few exceptions.

Years ago the Masonic family, prior to television, computers, iPad, computer games and Monday night football, was a place to go and socialize. Today we can do that with Facebook, email, twitter and text. So what can we do to increase our lodge attendance? I don't believe there is just one answer but a combination of things to be considered.

It is my opinion that we should start off with that

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petition to become a Master Mason or to join one of the concordant bodies, Scottish Rite, York Rite, Shrine etc.

The investigating team should be asking the questions not only about the petitioner's back ground and character but *why* does he want to be a Mason, Scottish Rite, York Rite etc.

He needs to be informed of his responsibilities and the importance of being at the stated meetings.

The <u>top line signer</u> should be held responsible for that brother for a minimum of at least one year. I know a brother who was asked on many different occasions to join one of these concordant bodies.

Since he joined, no one has called him to ask why he is not showing up at the meetings. Several other brothers I know were made Shriners on the spot and again never invited to attend the meetings or received the initiation others received.

That Brother honestly felt cheated. He was just a member. Someone was more interested in numbers.

We need to inform prospective members of the Blue Lodge requirement to memorize the posting lecture and what is expected of them. I am a firm believer that that is why every lodge has a substantial list of brothers who have not progressed past the first degree. I could write several pages about this topic alone but I think you get the idea.

As you may know- My theme this year has been: Ritual, Education and Communication. The reason I

chose this theme is because I believe it to be a part of the key to improving lodge attendance. Let's start off with ritual. Ask yourself- Do you like to go to a lodge and watch the Worshipful Master read from the cypher to open his Lodge or to confer a degree? I can honestly say I have not found one brother that has said yes to that question.

Put yourself in this position. Let's just say you are a member of a lodge and a visitor shows up to attend your meeting. Whether he is a Master Mason or maybe a Grand Master from a visiting jurisdiction how would you feel if your lodge could not even open the meeting without reading it out of a book? The point here is if you are going to be in one of these leadership positions you need to know you stuff instead of reading it out of a cypher. The Scottish and York Rites are a little different.

Education is very important. Our younger members want to know *why*. *Why* do we do this and *why* do we do that? What is the history behind Masonry? Matanuska Lodge # 7, Anchorage Lodge #17 and Aurora Lodge #15 all have educational programs in place that include topics to discuss on a regular basis and their Lodge attendances are improving. If you want help starting an educational program just ask and I'm sure the Grand Lodge will point you in the right direction.

Communication has long been a topic of interest to me. I really don't know anyone that does not like the pat on the back for doing a good job. The other thing I think we forget is birthdays, wedding anniversary, birth of a child, retirement, or the death of a loved one. A card or a note on Facebook will let that individual know you care. My birthday was November 9<sup>th</sup> and I received many birthday wishes by way of Facebook. It made me feel good that my

brothers and friends took a moment out of their schedule to wish me a happy birthday. If a brother has not shown up at a meeting, call him and ask why. Is he sick? Did he get off work late? You will show that you care. I know a lady that went to church and became ill. No one called her from her own church. Needless to say, she doesn't go to that church any longer. Tell people that you are a Master Mason, Scottish Rite Mason, York Rite Mason etc. Brag about what we do in Scottish Rite Masonry for example. Tell people we spend millions of dollars every day to help a child with speech therapy. The Shrine spends a little over two million dollars a day to help children that have been burned or have orthopedic problems. My Deputy Grand Master, Dave Worel, calls it Masonic Awareness. We really need to do more of it. Some of our older members believe you should not ask anyone if they want to be a Mason. I honestly don't believe that, but I respect the tradition. I will however tell an individual that they would make a great Mason and when they finally get down to asking how they can become a Mason- I hand them a petition and tell them the just did.

The last topic I'd like to cover is: Have Fun. If you're not doing things in your lodge to have some fun then you're missing the boat. I've heard it said many times that a bad day of fishing is better than a good day at the office. We all like to have fun and that is one reasons the Shrine is successful. They have fun while at the same time providing a program to help children. There are many things you can do. Hold a meeting on Monday night to watch a football game. Plan a fishing trip, etc. I can promise you that the first couple times you try this, you may not have many show up, but if you are having fun the word will get out and the attendance will improve not only at your fun meetings but also your stated

meetings so they can find out what is planned next.

This may not fix every problem you have but I hope it will help. All I ask of you is to give it some thought. One of the most important suggestions I can give you is to have a meeting just about your lodge attendance and ask for suggestion on how to improve it. It is a tough battle to get someone back once you lose them but it *is possible*. The key however is not to lose them in the first place.

I want you all to know that I've really enjoyed my four years in the Grand Lodge Line. I want to thank each and every one of you for your support and votes of confidence in each of the four elections. I hope and pray that I have represented you as Grand Master of Alaska in a way you can be proud of. I have been extremely proud of each and every one of you. on December 14<sup>th</sup> and was very well attended including M W James Herrington, Grand Master of Alaska. I was honored to be




Installing Master for Brother Tom Lehe and the Officers of Matanuska Lodge.

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## West to East & Back Again, again...

September 2013

Just a short re-cap, stepping back to 2011 - W Claude "Vapor Rider" Roberts and I, Jeff "Cat Herder" DeFreest, made a sojourn across North America to attend the Widows Sons' International Grand Gathering being held in Kingston Ontario. There we met Brothers from around the realm – the North, the

Midwest, the South, and Provinces of Canada to name a few. We had the chance to get to know and ride with many Brothers from New



England, in particular, Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and the "Pine Tree Riders" representing the Grand Chapter of Maine. I reported on these events, and others, experienced during my term as the Grand Orator for MW Ron Ackerman, at the Grand Lodge Communication in February 2012 at Anchorage.

Now moving forward, summer 2013 – The fellowship amongst Widows Sons continues; the subsequent International Grand Gathering of Widows Sons, held over Labor Day Weekend for 2013, took place in Acton, Maine. Two Brothers –



"Cat Herder" and Chris "Pinky" Fratello,, representing the Grand Chapter of Alaska, rode the furthest, following the pavement across the United States and Canada,

while nine Brothers traveled the furthest, representing the Grand Chapter of Finland!

Only having been able to escape the clutches work for couple weeks this summer, I plotted the most expedient course to get there. My Harley "Road King" and I boarded the southbound ferry at Ketchikan on Wednesday August 21st and arrived at Bellingham, WA on Friday morning. By way of the "Super-Slab" or Interstates, we rode like the wind. The first stop for rest was Miles City, MT - some 17 hours on the road, covering about 1100 miles. During the next day, I experienced the 100 degree heat, crossing to Fargo ND, and then veering southward to Sioux Falls, SD. There I met up with my bride's uncle - Uncle Bob. He'd ridden like the wind from South Carolina to South Dakota on his new Harley Softail to join me for the eastward ride across the Midwest and to sail across Lake Michigan. The SS Badger, a coal-fired rail-car ferry, carried us from Manitowoc, WI across to Luddington, MI what a great opportunity for a couple modern day bikers to experience some real American history. After brushing off the coal dust and disembarking, we rode onto Akron, OH for a day's rest with my



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family, and then onto Pennsylvania where Uncle Bob headed south for home, and I continued onto New York to find some Widows Sons...

Along the New York Turnpike, at a fuel stop, I was met by a small contingent of Widows Sons on the road from Rochester, heading for Maine. I was smoked, another day of riding in sweltering downsouth heat, but running into these guys refreshed my spirit enough to ride on, at least as far as my family's historical stomping grounds, near DeFreestville, NY. And then finally, on Friday, I closed the gap and rode into Acton Maine to be met at the gate. After six and a half days on the road and 3777 miles on the odometer, I'd arrived. I was met by Chip Gavel, President of the Pine Tree Riders, Panda, Mike Lytle & his lady, Angel, and of course "Cramer".

The Grand Gathering events were well organized, starting with scenic autumn rides each day, a Biker-Rodeo, live music each night, and a Widows Sons Branding as finale on Saturday night. In all, about 400 Brother Masons attended, including the MW James Ross, Grand Master of Maine.

Having experienced the Branding Ceremony in Ontario, I was able to participate and helped to brand about 135 new Masons as Widows Sons... The secluded outdoor ceremony took place well after dark, with a lightning storm illuminating the skies around us. A very mystical experience was had by all; and with only a spritz of rain as we rode back to Acton.

Then came the time to roll westward once again. The return leg of my journey had only five days allocated to ride in order to catch the ferry at Bellingham. Ohio the first night, just west of Chicago the next, and back to Sioux Falls, then Missoula; wow, I was tired. The

weather stayed warm (well, HOT) and somehow I was able to thread the needle between western thunderstorms, until the last day. But as luck would have it, I made northern Idaho on time, to meet up with family, where my father-in-law had hooked up a trailer to his truck, just in case I wanted a ride across Washington, so that we could visit. My bride, Kari, was flying down from Ketchikan to meet me at Seattle, and her folks were going to drive over to see her, so, hmm, lets see - my bike has NEVER been on a trailer, but my rear tire is near bald, and another 400 miles yet to go, I've crossed the continent enough times now, so I didn't need it for my ego - so who'd turn down that kind offer?



So on we loaded. We enjoyed a dinner and a few miles of conversation, and then drove into what was the worst storm I'd seen in years! The skies opened

up just west of Spokane, and we experienced about 6 hours of driving in the worst storm with gusty crosswinds, lightning, and heavy rains. It was so bad I removed the windshield off my bike and put it in the truck. All the way across Washington it howled and rained. Gosh it was nice to be in a cab, for a change. In the Seattle area, we met up with Kari and I found a Harley shop to replace my tire, while they went off to socialize. I completed the journey to meet the ferry in Bellingham, riding the last 75-80 miles to break in that new tire. Then Kari and I enjoyed the cruise home together...



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Not a bad way to end another trip from West to the East and back again. All told, two and a half weeks on the road, 7000 miles on the odometer. Old friendships rekindled, and new ones made. Masonry is alive and well across North America and the Widows Sons Masonic Motorcycle Riders Association is proud to have a part in spreading the cement of Masonic fellowship.

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### Grand Lecturer's Message, cont.

#### Originally Presented to Mt. Juneau-Gastineaux #21

MWGM James Herrington's 2013 Theme:

"Ritual, Education, Communication"

Thank you MW Jim. I would like to openly thank the Grand Master for allowing me to be of service in this manner.

Owing to the nature of my title, I thought I would provide a short lecture along with some thoughts and my experiences.



It is often said that Masonry is a Fraternity with a goal of making good men better.

Masonry is a beautiful system of morality, veiled in allegory, and illustrated by symbols.

Merriam-Webster provides the following applicable definitions:

- Morality is defined as conformity to the ideals of right human conduct.
- Allegory is a work of written, oral, or visual expression that uses symbolic figures, objects, and actions to convey truths or generalizations about human conduct or experience.
- Symbols are a visible sign of something invisible. We use the "working tools" of Operative Masonry, most notably the Square and Compasses, to instill the precepts of our Fraternity to our candidates.

Sounds like us, I think! I believe in our case the adoption of our principles produce visible signs as well. "People will know us by our works and conduct." So, there is a lot to learn. Becoming a Master Mason, is not unlike an electrician or carpentry apprentice striving to be a Journeyman and then a Master Craftsman. He must learn and work hard before advancing. Unlike civic organizations and most other fraternal groups, A Mason must earn the right to move from an Apprentice to a

Fellow Craft to a Master.

The Mason must master each degree before being passed and raised.

Then more work is required to be eligible for high office within the Lodge.

Since it is our goal to make good men better, Degree Work is the most important thing we do in Blue Lodge Masonry and something we should strive to do as best as we can.

I believe the Grand Master agrees.

At this point I'd like thank our Senior Warden Ken Vaughn for the hard work he has done expanding the ranks of those performing our degree work, especially in the area of our Drama and Lectures. Ken has done what I hoped when I spoke about "The Masters of the Work" as I completed my time in the East. I believe #21 does some of the best degree work in Alaska. However, I believe Brother Ken would agree, there is always room for improvement at all positions. Ken has a talent for motivating people. He was the motivation for my taking on a critical part in the Drama. In my case he motivated me by suggesting my work was a bit wanting a couple of years ago. This got under my skin and I said to myself, I'll show him! Anyway, it is important for us to strive for the best degree work we can accomplish.

When someone makes themselves available for the chairs or an appointed office, they are telling the Lodge and Worshipful Master they are willing to do the work that position requires, should the Lodge or the Master "hire them." The Lodge members do not expect perfection from their officers, no one is among us is perfect. However, it is reasonable for the lodge to expect the officer to strive for progress in his work.

Progress, not perfection, is the goal.

This is similar to saying a Mason is suitably proficient in a degree. When we do we are not saying they are perfect.
