Leroy Duncan Officers Travel to Carnesville Lodge

Leroy Duncan Lodge No. 262, which meets at 11:00 am on the second Tuesday of each month at the Atlanta Masonic Center, is a small lodge with a big heart and a bright future.

At the February 2013 meeting, Most Worshipful Bro. E. Ray Knittel made an official visitation to Leroy Duncan Lodge. Bro. Ray's visit was the first visit by a sitting Grand Master in at least 30 years. The lodge gave Bro. Ray a \$1,000 check for the Masonic Home and another check to help the Grand Master with his travels around the state.

In April, the lodge brethren learned of a need at Carnesville Lodge No. 186. Carnesville Lodge has been meeting over a drugstore in Carnesville since 1955. The owner of the drugstore recently passed away and the new owner asked the Freemasons to move out when their current lease expires.

The brethren of Leroy Duncan voted to help Carnesville Lodge build a new lodge hall. On May 16, the three top officers of Leroy Duncan traveled to a regular communication of Carnesville Lodge and presented a check for \$1,000 to a surprised Worshipful Master.

Carnesville Lodge has purchased land for their new lodge hall just outside Carnesville; the land has been leveled and awaits the construction of the lodge hall.

You indeed “Make A Difference.” I remembered a song by Natalie Grant and looked up the lyrics which go:

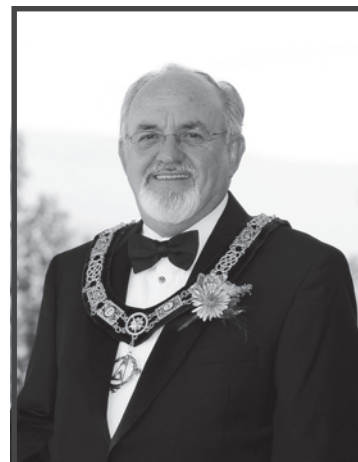
Every life has a choice

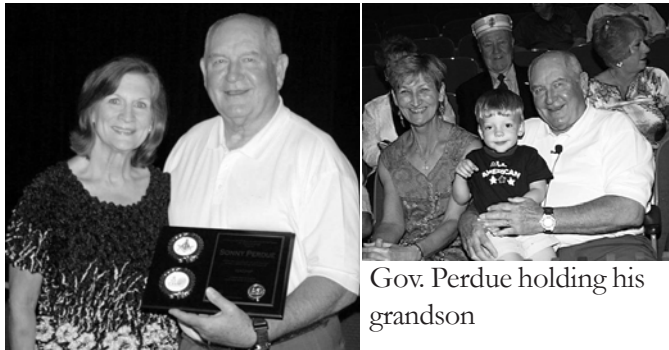

In August 2003, Mrs. Perdue launched her "Our Children" campaign, to raise awareness about the need for foster care programs in Georgia and to encourage individuals, corporations and faith-based organizations to take an active role in addressing the needs of their community. Her objective was to increase the number of available foster homes and volunteer hours, and financial and in-kind contributions to our youth-serving organizations.

In 1998, Mrs. Perdue and her husband, Governor Sonny Perdue, served as foster parents for eight newborns awaiting adoption through Covenant Care in Macon, Georgia. Their personal experience served as the inspiration for this initiative. Additionally, Mrs. Perdue created the First Lady's Children's Cabinet, whose mission was to stem child abuse and neglect and to promote foster care and adoption. Cabinet members included heads of state agencies that address children's issues.

Important Deadline: Bills and Resolutions

Brethren, I would like to draw your attention to Masonic Code, Sections 3-113 and 3-114. Both Code Sections address the method and time when proposed changes to the Masonic Code are to be submitted to the Grand Lodge office. Should you have a particular Section of the Code that you feel needs

to be revised, now is the time to write it up and submit it to the Grand Lodge office. In order to be considered at the next Grand Lodge session, it must be received no later than **August 1**.

Important Deadline: Lodge By-Laws

Brethren, are your Lodge By-Laws current? If not, now is the time to bring them up-to-date. Masonic Code, Chapter 22-1, and subsequent sections outline the various steps to take in order to update the By-Laws, not only for your members, but also for the Grand Lodge office.

If you would like to completely rewrite your By-Laws, we have a booklet that outlines a standard set of By-Laws. We would be happy to send you a copy should you need one.

In mid-September, the Charter and By-Laws Committee meets to review those By-Laws and Amendments that have been presented to this office for consideration at the next Annual Communication of Grand Lodge. According to Masonic Code, Section 22-102, changes to the By-Laws must be received in the Grand Lodge office no later than **September 15** to be considered by the committee.

Although not required by the Masonic Code, the Charter and By-Laws Committee asks that the changes contain the signatures of the lodge By-Laws Committeemen, the date of the first and second readings and the Lodge Seal. This action certifies that this is a legitimate change by the lodge and not a whim by one or two individuals.

Snellville Area Masons Participate in Snellville Flag Day Ceremony

Snellville area Freemasons, the majority of them Veterans, participated in the 2nd Annual Snellville Flag Day Ceremony June 14. The ceremony was the dream of City Councilman Mike Sabbagh, who was recently raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason at Snellville Masonic Lodge No. 99.

The Fourth of July is traditionally celebrated as America's birthday, but the idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the Flag is believed to have first originated in 1885. B.J. Cigrand, a schoolteacher, arranged for the pupils in the Fredonia, Wisconsin Public School, District 6, to observe June 14 (the 108th anniversary of the official adoption of The Stars and Stripes) as 'Flag Birthday'.

In 1894, the governor of New York directed that on June 14 the Flag be displayed on all public buildings. With Cigrand and Leroy Van Horn as the moving spirits, the Illinois organization, known as the American Flag Day Association, was organized for the purpose of promoting the holding of Flag Day exercises. On June 14th, 1894, under the auspices of this association, the first general public school children's celebration of Flag Day in Chicago was held in Douglas, Garfield, Humboldt, Lincoln, and Washington Parks, with more than 300,000 children participating.

Inspired by decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day - the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 — was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30th, 1916. While Flag Day was celebrated in various communities for years after Wilson's proclamation, it was not until August 3rd, 1949, that President and Most Worshipful Brother Harry S Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th of each year as National Flag Day.

The 6th District Convention is held annually at the St. Johns Lodge due to its central location in the 6th District. Wor. Bro. Kenneth M. Owens is Master of Morrow Lodge.

Lodge was opened by Wor. Master A. Hendry Betts II and his district officers at 9.00 a.m. Due to the larger than expected attendance, additional chairs were brought into the lodge room from the dining hall.

Most Worshipful Bro. E. Ray Knittel presented himself for an official visitation and was given Private Grand Honors. He introduced his officers who were present.

Wor. Bro. Terry Farmer introduced other dignitaries, including all four District Deputies to the Grand Master: Wor. Bros. Brandon Yarbrough (A), Jere Crumley (B), Larry Ellenberg (C), Timothy Legarth (D), and Charles Holloway (E). He also introduced Wor. Bro. Mark S. Johnson, M.I.G.M., Grand Council of Royal and Select Masons; and Wor. Bro. Tony Gonzales, Deputy Master of the 5th Masonic District Convention.

Wor. Master Betts thanked the lodges of the 6th District for donating \$1,485 to purchase new aprons for the district officers. Marshall A Weir No. 448, a 6th District lodge which has voted to give up its charter, donated their jewels to the district. Aprons and cases were purchased from Hobby Lobby for \$927. The district voted to donate the remaining \$558 to the Masonic Home Endowment Fund.

A special collection was taken to help replace the roof on a home at the Masonic Home. \$739 was received. A motion was made and passed to donate an additional \$1,000 from the 6th District for the roofing fund.

Six 50-year Masons and one 60-year Mason (Most Worshipful Bro. C. E. "Buster" Horne) were present. Thirteen Past District Masters and 14 sitting lodge Masters were recognized.

District Custodian Ed Shaw reported that 36 of the 37 lodges had been involved in Schools of Instruction during the past year. Wor. Bro. Shaw reported he had given out 221 white cards, 197 blue cards, 27 green cards and 15 orange cards to worthy Brethren.

A framed GACHIP certificate was presented to Bro. Ed Burns for his leadership in three GACHIP events identifying 294 kids. Sincerity Lodge No. 430 was also recognized for its work with GACHIP events.

The John S. Perry Award for Mason of the Year was presented to Right Worshipful Bro. Merrill A. Clark, Sr., Grand Treasurer Emeritus, for his years of hard work both in the fraternity and in his community. Wor. Bro. Emmett Johns read Bro. Merrill's bio; just listening to what Bro. Merrill

has done for others made all of us tired. How did he have the time and energy to do all of that? Of course, being the gentleman that he is, Bro. Merrill insisted he had not done very much and was not deserving of the award.



The attendance award for a small lodge (fewer than a 100 members) was presented to Flint River Daylight Lodge No. 761. The attendance

award for a large lodge (more than 99 members) was presented to Hampton Lodge No. 70.

On the advice of his two doctors, Wor. Bro. A. Jack Long, Deputy Master, did not stand for election as District Master. The 6th District Brethren voted to name Bro. Long, a 57-year Mason, Honorary Past Master.

Wor. Bro. Terry Farmer, who served as Senior Warden during the previous year, was elected District Master. He and the other district officers were installed by Most Worshipful Brother E. Ray Knittel.

Grand Master Knittel closed the lodge in peace and harmony. The Brethren then adjourned to the dining hall for a BBQ meal prepared by the Brethren of Morrow Lodge.

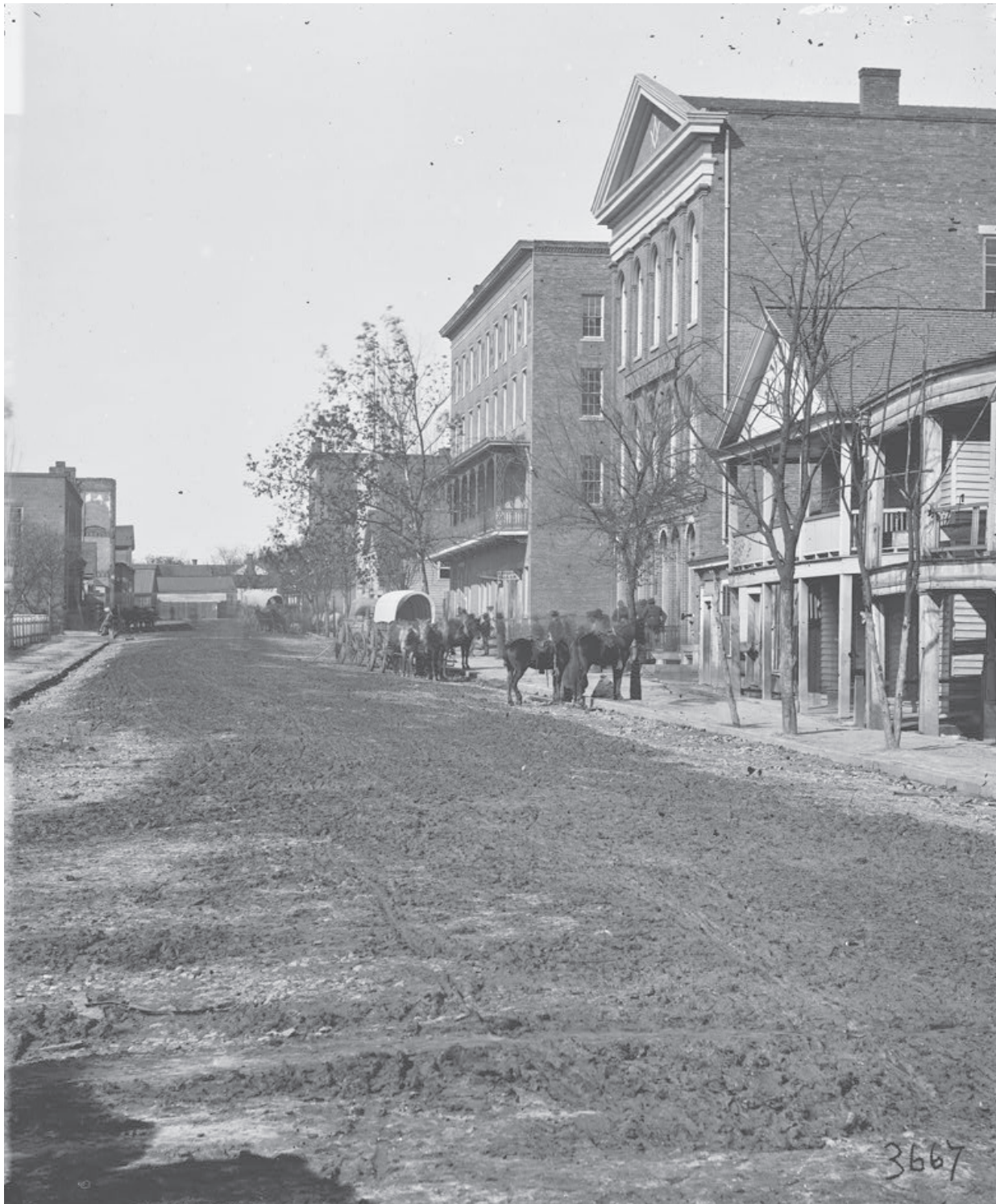

Do you Recognize this 1864 Photo of a Georgia Lodge?



Founded and erected in 1844, this lodge is now 169 years old. This three-story lodge building was later torn down and replaced by another three-story lodge building in 1924. The second three-story lodge building is still in use and was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1982.

Benevolent Masonic Lodge No. 3 also meets on the third floor of their lodge building. Meridian Sun Masonic

This also might promote other fathers and family members the desire to learn more about Freemasonry, which might bring more quality brothers into our Masonic family.

The middle son is at home on life support and doesn't have long to live. The youngest son is the one who came to the movie in his motorized wheel chair. The mother and her young son sat through the whole movie enjoying every minute of



it. When the movie ended, I went to thank all our guests and give them a choice of upcoming movies. She came up to me, thanking the lodge for allowing her son the pleasure of seeing “The Sword in The Stone.” She expressed that they would be back as often as his health permitted. Knowing that the lodge was able to provide an evening of joy and entertainment for this young man and his mother made every time we have presented this movie a totally worthy event.

In closing my brothers, if you have the opportunity to do something like this for your community, please do it as you will be rewarded in the end more than you can ever imagine. If you are unable to provide such an event, you are always welcome to come to Shannon No. 100 the 3rd Saturday of each month from March through October to enjoy an evening with a good family movie. Oblique Light

Last week I was working in my yard. It was very late and the low sun cast long shadows. Small variations in the height of the grass were easier to see and made the chore of mowing the lawn a little easier. Plasterers and dry wall workers use light cast at a broad angle to check their work; the light exaggerates shadows of imperfections, which are then corrected. Forensic document examiners employ *oblique lighting* – the technical term for this technique – to detect and examine indented writing.

As Masons, we are encouraged to seek the light of truth, learn from its glow, and apply the knowledge in bettering ourselves. Sometimes this illumination is the compared to a blinding flash of realization, an “Aha!” moment. At other times this symbolic light is compared to the bright light of mid day. Its intensity is direct, harsh. It casts few shadows but is well suited for both ordinary and close work. The heat it generates can make us uncomfortable.

Oblique light, on the other hand, seems to be better suited for introspection. It makes the iteration of self-examination and correction a little less tedious. We must remember that only the shadows, not the imperfections themselves, are exaggerated. These shadows create darker spaces but not true darkness. These darker spaces remind us to employ discretion when seeing others in oblique light. Introspection in the presence of oblique light can aid in squaring our actions toward others.

Yaarab Shrine "Road-Runners"

Patients who go to Shriners Hospitals for Children may face many follow up trips to our hospitals, after their initial procedures. To accomplish making sure they get back and forth, nobles from Alee Shrine in Savannah, Hasan Shrine in Albany and Yaarab Shrine in Atlanta volunteer their time to drive the children and family members to either the Greenville or Cincinnati Shriners Hospital for Children. Trips are also made to other Shriners Hospitals for Children for children whose family has moved from another city, but still need their follow up doctor's visits.

Nobles from Yaarab, known as Yaarab's "Road-runners" are directed by noble Harold Brooks. Yaarab Shrine operates a fleet of vans for transporting the children and their families back and forth for these visits. There is no costs incurred for these follow up visits or the transportation trips to the patient's families.



The Yaarab nobles don't focus on individual recognition, but want to make sure these kids are fully taken care of. In any one month, there might be as many as 20 trips made to the Greenville Shriners Hospitals, and 15 trips made to the Cincinnati Burns Hospital for Children. As many as 25 nobles volunteer monthly to transport the children

which earns them recognition as Yaarab "Road-runners." For those children whose families have been transferred to Atlanta, trips are arranged for Yaarab to transport these patients, as well, to those respective facilities treating the children.

Many accolades of appreciation and special thanks go to the nobles who have become "Road-runners." To belong to this elite group of Shrine Masons, the requirements is to volunteer to make any of the patient follow-up trips to the respective Shriners Hospitals for Children.

Grand Master E. Ray Knittel Visits Augusta Veterans' Medical Centers

Most Worshipful Brother E. Ray Knittel; Wor. Bro. Charles Long, Grand Marshal; and Wor. Bro. Gary Leazer, Senior Grand Deacon, visited three Veterans' Medical Centers in Augusta on May 20. We were escorted around the facilities by Wor. Bro. and Col. Frank Valentine (U.S. Army, Ret.) and Wor. Bro. and Command Sergeant Major Jim Huggins (U.S. Army, Ret.) Wor. Bro. Richard Williamson accompanied us on the tours, along with Wor. Bro. and Masonic Service Association Rep Chuck Riggan (U.S. Army, Ret.)

Our first stop was the Wounded Warrior Battalion at Fort Gordon where Lt. Col. McCormick and CSM Wade explained the work done at the center.

We stopped at the Blind Rehab Center at one of the two VA Centers in Augusta. There are 15 beds in this unit. The majority of patients suffer from low vision. Some patients suffer from brain injuries which can cause problems years later. Paul Whitten, chief of the center, told us blindness challenges our egos, especially for males, and can lead to suicides. Mr. Whitten said persons never adjust to blindness, he/she merely learns to cope with blindness.

We met many veterans, including Lt. Commander Vance Cornelius (U.S. Navy, Ret.) who, in spite of his blindness, was as chipper as anyone could be.

We were impressed with the many programs and activities available to assist veterans in their treatment. One such computer program is Jaws. Manual skills training is

available, which includes making one's own coffee, and wood working shops using table saws and planers. Therapy pools are available to ease veterans in the movement of their legs.

We stopped at the Fisher Home, one of 60 in the VA system. Families of veterans may stay in the home at no cost from three to ninety days, although the time can be extended. The longest stay at this home has been 320 nights. The philosophy of the Fisher Homes is "love is the best medicine."

Getting away from the hospital environment is important for recovery. Veterans are sometimes taken on wheel-chair assessable camping at no cost to the veterans. Camping activities include kayaking, boating, fishing, archery and zip lining. These activities are not covered by the VA hospital budget so voluntary donations are accepted to allow for these activities.

The tour was an eye-opening experience for each of us as we saw veterans doing unbelievable activities while coping with physical and mental issues most of us cannot imagine.

Grovetown Lodge No. 730 invites veterans to meals at the lodge several times a year. The VA Hospital provides transportation. Last Christmas, the lodge gave veterans \$1,017 in canteen coupons.

Georgia Veterans Corner

Brothers All, Veterans and non-Veterans alike. Did you know of the VA Medical Foster Home Program? Some of our veterans are getting up in age; our fathers, grandfathers, etc. Have you thought of what to do if the need arises for their care?

The Atlanta VA Medical Center Medical Foster Home Program is an alternative to long term care of nursing home placement for dependent, chronically or terminally ill Veterans with limited family support.

A community based living option for Veterans who cannot live independently due to functional, cognitive, or psychosocial impairment. A partnership with VA Home Based Primary & Palliative Care (HBPPC) providing home visits by the VA Primary Care Provider, Psychologist, Nurse, Physical Therapist, Social Worker and Dietitian.

How does this benefit Veterans? It includes personal care assistance, transportation to appointments, housing, and individualized attention in a warm and inviting home setting. It may save the Veteran money by reducing hospital or nursing home admissions. It can include end of life care with the opportunity to include the Veteran in household decisions. It has 24 hour supervision with private or semi-private rooms available with the possibility for pets to reside with the Veterans.

You can also become a Caregiver to our Veterans if you so choose. The 5 requirements for Caregivers are: 1) Completion of the application and interview process with Medical Center staff. 2) Be at least 21 years of age, financially stable, and physically able to provide care. 3) Must have a written backup plan with a designated relief person when the caregiver is unable to provide care in case of sickness, etc. 4) Keep HBPPC medical staff informed about changes in the Veterans appearance, behavior, or health. 5) Completion of annual agreements between the Caregiver, Veteran and his/her family or representative is required to ensure a friendly and caring atmosphere within the home.

The requirements for homes are: 1)be the Caregivers primary residence, 2)be designed, equipped, and maintained to provide a safe environment, personal care, and supervision for Veterans. 3)homes must comply with recommendations from annual inspections by the VA Staff and 4)meet federal, state, and local regulations including fire, construction, maintenance, and sanitation.

The VA Medical Foster Home, Where Heroes Meet Angels. For more information on this program you can contact Indira Brevick at 404-321-6111 Ext 2524. Our motto is; "Patient Centered Care, Second to None, One Veteran at a Time." There comes a time when our heroes need more help, if you need assistance call and see what this program can do for you, or for your aged Veteran relative.

For those that do not know I would like to share the names of the Masonic VA Representatives in our VAMC's.

In the Atlanta VAMC area are Brother Rick Conn, Rep and Victor McKelvey Deputy Rep; at the Augusta VAMC are Brother Charles Riggan, Rep, and Dennis Salmon, Deputy Rep. At the Dublin VAMC is Brother Adolph (Doc) Bowman, Rep. If you live in the areas of these VAMC's you may contact them for assistance. They should be able to assist you in pointing you in the right direction to achieve your task at hand. An update on our Masonic program in our VAMC's! So far in 2013 we have certified 11 new Representatives in various VAMC's and State Veterans Homes. We are filling more vacancies and showing a surge in support of our Masonic Hospital Visitation Program. But, we are always looking for Brothers for Deputies to help our Representatives as they get their jobs accomplished. We are always looking for volunteers on a regular basis. We do appreciate all the support shown by the Grand Lodges and those that have come forth to serve our Veterans. M.W. B. E. Ray Knittel will be visiting our Augusta VAMC this month with our Rep there, WB Chuck Riggan. He will be visiting both uptown and downtown units and also the Wounded Warrior program at Fort Gordon. Our Grand Master is dedicated to our Veteran support this year. May God Bless him in his travels!

And on the education scene! I have not heard about the others yet, but will in time I have no doubt, but the Tuition Assistance plan for the Marine Corps has been halted. Facing federal budget cuts the USMC has killed its popular tuition assistance program for the rest of fiscal 2013. The program cost the USMC \$47 million in fiscal 2012, and was used by 29,507 Marines, more than 15 percent of the active duty forces. Four things I suggest you do at present. 1) Don't drop your current classes; this change will not affect classes currently in progress. 2) Talk to your Education Service Officer. ESO's know the options and programs available at your installation. So get in line quick. 3) Talk to your school about what you will have to do it you have to take a short break. What scholarship programs do they have available, and how to sign up again when you get funds reinstated. And 4) Fill out a FAFSA. This is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid. With the GI Bill and the Tuition Assistance program being always available Veterans have forgotten about this program. Other Branches of Service need to check and see if their programs are going away any time soon and take measures now to ensure your educational benefits continue.
